

Patriotgirls set sightson RRC championship

Hills-Beaver Creek High School volleyball coach Susan Bork finds herself in an enviable position as the 2016 season approaches.

With a roster loaded with experience and talent, Bork believes the sky is the limit for her Patriots this fall.

"Having all these players coming back makes life pretty simple for me," Bork offered.

"I've been coaching here for three years now, and this is the year we've been waiting for. We have a lot of experienced kids on this team, and I think this will be a good year for them."

Bork has good reason to be very optimistic about H-BC's fate in 2016.

With all of the key members of a 2015 team that finished the year with a winning record returning to the ranks, H-BC will be a formidable opponent for every team on its schedule.

The Patriots earned a share of fourth place in the Red Rock Conference with a 6-4 record during a 13-12 regular season in 2015.

H-BCrolled to a 3-0 victory over Adrian during the opening round of the South Section 3A Tournament before falling by a 3-0 tally to eventual tournament champion Windom in the quarterfinals.

H-BC did lose seniors Tessa Klarenbeek (who received playing time in the back row last fall) and Thea Richards, who received limited playing time in 2015.

The Patriots, however, return a number of battle-tested players who could turn the 2016 campaign into a memorable one.

"We definitely have a great mix of girls on this team," Bork said.

"All of them are very versatile players and we've got big hitters who can hit the ball in all three positions of the front row. These girls give me a lot of options as a coach."

H-BC has seven seniors, seven juniors and five sophomores participating in the program this year.

The list features nine players who logged a lot of court time, two All-RRC selections and one RRC honorable mention performer from the 2015 season.

As all-conference selections,

seniors Avery Van Roekel and Jasmine Lingen have to be considered the leaders of the 2016 team.

Van Roekel, a 5-11 middle hitter, is the type of player who rarely leaves the court.

Lingen is a 5-11 middle hitter who makes most of her contributions to the team in the front row.

Sophomore Sidney Fick, a 6-0 left-side hitter, is another all-

around player.
Fick drew honorable mention recognition from the RRC coaches as a freshman.

Other players returning to the team with starting experience include seniors Mekayla Kolbrek and Ashley Esselink and juniors Olivia Richards and Avery Wysong.

Kolbrek is a 5-5 setter who sets up H-BC's hitters at the net, while Wysong is a 5-9 right-side hitter/setter.

Esselink and Richards shared a starting position in 2015.

Esselink is a 5-10 right-side

hitter, while Richards is a 5-10 outside hitter.

Along with the starters, two more Patriots gained a lot of varsity experience in 2015.

Courtney Kruger, a 5-3 senior, is a defensive ace in the back row and a setter.

Paige Tilstra, a 5-6 junior, is an outside hitter and a back row defender.

Those nine players are expected to be the nucleus of a team that Bork wants to improve in a couple of areas.

"There always are things we can clean up, and the one thing this group will focus on is getting our serves under control. That's how you can take control of a match," Bork said.

"We also want to improve on our passing and our communication. You can't win games with your mouth shut on the court. We need everyone to talk to each other and play as a team."

Seniors Emma Gehrke, a 5-10

middle hitter, and Hunter Harvey, a 5-6 middle hitter, are potential varsity contributors this fall.

Juniors Megan Gehrke (5-9 all-around player), Halle Hoekstra (5-10 left-side hitter), Grace Holthaus (5-2 setter) and Kourtney Rozeboom (6-1 right-side hitter) are varsity prospects.

Sophomores Bailey Swan (5-8 right-side hitter), Madison Spath (5-4 middle hitter), Grace Bundesen (5-8 middle hitter) and Alexia Boltjes (5-4 left-side hitter) are members of the program as well.

Borklists Red Rock Central and Southwest Christian as the teams H-BC needs to beat in order to accomplish a goal the players are pursuing in 2016.

"The players have a goal, and it has been an ongoing thing, to win the conference championship," Bork said.

"As for myself, I want to see us finish among the top three teams in the conference and see what happens after that."

Season ofpromise awaits H-BC football team

A promising season is at hand for the 2016 Hills-Beaver Creek High School football team.

With key players returning to crucial positions on both sides of the line of scrimmage, H-BC coach Rex Metzger is extremely optimistic about the upcoming campaign.

"We got a good team," he offered.

"We need to remain healthy and do have some inexperienced players at a couple of positions, but we think this is a team that can do some things this year."

H-BC had a good team in 2015 as well.

The Patriots captured a share of the South District West Division title during a 7-1 regular season that included H-BC earning the No. 1 seed for the Section 3 Nine-Man Playoffs.

H-BC rolled to a 58-28 victory over Heron Lake-Okabena during the opening round of section play, but an 8-2 season came to an end with a stunning, 14-12 loss to Edgerton-Ellsworth in the semifinals.

The loss to E-Eleft a bad taste in the mouths of the H-BC coaches and players, and Metzger believes his team has the potential to avoid that type of disappointment this fall.

"We always shoot to be one of the top two teams in our district and we think that can happen," Metzger said.

"Then we want to make a run in the playoffs and hopefully make it to Marshall and play for a section championship."

H-BC needs to replace four key players from the 2015 roster to make 2016 a memorable season.

Drew Forshey (defensive end/tight end), Cooper Vaughn (safety/wide receiver) and Stuart Plimpton (fullback/middle linebacker) played as two-way starters during their senior seasons.

Plimpton and Vaughn earned positions on the All-District roster at season's end, and Forshey received honorable mention.

H-BC also has to replace Michael Taubert, who started as a defensive end as a junior before moving out of the H-BC school district over the summer.

"All four of those guys could play multiple positions for us, which was nice because we could move them around to where we needed them," Metzger said.

"They were good athletes who were physical guys. They were good leaders and they brought a lot of experience to our team last year."

H-BC did lose some talented players, but by no means is the cupboard bare.

The Patriots will field an offense that features six returning starts, three all-district performers and one honorable mention selection from the 2015 season.

H-BCis extremely experienced

on the offensive line and in the backfield, where the six returning starters will play.

Senior Logan Leuthold, a 175-pound guard who made the all-district squad last fall, spearheads an interior line that includes three returning starters.

Senior Dylan Forshey (205) is back as the starting center, and sophomore Garrett Raymon (230) returns as a starting guard.

"We have three guys with experience one the line, which is a positive thing. It's nice to have experience up front," Metzger offered

Juniors Jesse Elbers (255) and Jacob Wingert (175) are expected

to gain playing time on the interior line as well.

H-BC also has experience at one of the tight end positions, where senior Jed Burgers (180) received some playing time in 2015.

The other tight end position is up for grabs with inexperienced juniors Dean Fuerstenberg (160), Dylon Taubert (180) and Dylan Tieszen (160) being the leading candidates.

H-BC also will be thin on experience at the fullback and wide receiver positions.

Preston Maassen, a 175-pound

junior, is the projected fullback. Juniors Josh Kueter (170) and

Dawson Leenderts (150) are challenging each other playing time as wide receivers.

H-BC is loaded with experience in the backfield, with three returning starters, including two three-year starters.

Senior quarterback Zach Scholten (185) and senior tailback Isaiah Vis (165) have been the leaders of H-BC's offense the past two seasons.

Both players were all-district selections in 2015.

Trenton Bass, a 165-junior, is another tailback who drew honorable mention honors from district coaches as a sophomore.

"We're going to be able to do a lot of different things on offense this year," Metzger said.

"We'll be able to have Scholten go under center and pound the ball with our experienced backs, and we can put him in shotgun formation and spread defenses out a little bit. We don't have a lot of experienced receivers, but I think that's something we can develop in practice."

H-BC also brings experience to the defensive side of the ball.

Forshey and Elbers return as starting tackles, with Raymon expected to gain playing time as a tackle as well.

The Patriots did lose both of their starting defensive ends from the 2015 campaign.

Metzger said Scholten will take over one end position, while Fuerstenberg and Kueter are battling for playing time at the other end position.

Leuthold, who started as an outside linebacker in 2015, is expected to play the middle linebacker position this fall.

Vis returns to the fold as a starting outside linebacker, while Maassen is expected to start as an outside linebacker for the first time.

With Burgers returning as a starting cornerback and Bass, who started as an outside linebacker in 2015, projected to be the starting safety, H-BC has experience in the secondary.

Leenderts is expected to play as a cornerback in 2016 as well.

"We are fast defensively," Metzger said.

"We are a little undersized on defense so we'll have to rely on getting a lot of guys flying to the football on defense. We do have more experience up front on defense than we've had in a couple of years. We're hoping that experience helps us control the line of scrimmage a little better."

Scholten will take care of the punting and kicking duties for H-BC again this year.

We have a very strong district with Cleveland, E-E and Mountain Lake Area fighting for the top spots in the conference along with us," Metzger said.

"We're shooting to be one of the top two teams in the district and to make a run in the section playoffs this year."

Line experience should lead to bigger things dr LHS football team

Optimism surrounds the Luverne High School football team heading into the 2016 season.

One year after bowing out of the Section 3AAA Playoffs in the opening round, the Cardinals have the potential to turn things around this fall.

Some of the optimism stems from an outstanding show at the annual summer team camp in Madison, South Dakota, where the Cardinals claimed the team championship.

While summer titles don't translate into fall victories, the late July accomplishment leads Cardinal coach Todd Oye to believe the 2016 team can meet some of his preseason goals.

"Our team goal is to play well enough in the regular season to get a home playoff game," he said.

"We also haven't won the Battle Axin three years, but we can make those things happen by getting better each day."

Luverne put together a 5-3 regular season that included a 4-3 mark (tie for third place) in the South Central District's White Division.

A 33-19 loss to Sibley East in section play ended a 5-4 campaign for the Cards.

LHS lost 13 seniors and another key contributor to 2015 team.

Erik Tofteland (tailback/defensive end) and Brandon Claussen (linebacker) were selected to the All-District squad at season's end.

Nick Overgaard, who made some starts as a quarterback before moving to the wide receiver position, drew honorable mention from district officials.

Other seniors who filled starting positions in 2015 include Blake Baum (fullback) Jakob Olson (center), Connor Sandbulte (defensive back), Mitchell Muller (linebacker) and Brennan Hart (linebacker).

Along with the seniors, LHS also lost the services of Jaxon Nelson when the hockey standout opted to play with the Sioux Falls Stampede this fall.

Nelson, another All-District selection, ended his sophomore season as the team's starting quarterback and a linebacker on defense.

With seven starters returning to the offensive unit, Cardinal fans have reason to be excited about the upcoming campaign.

Luverne will be thin on experience in the offensive backfield, but the Cards are loaded with experience on the line and at the wide receiver positions.

Five of the returning starters can be found on the offensive line, and seniors Logan Stratton and Chris Jelken lead the list as two-way starters.

Stratton, a 230-pound right tackle, made the All-District



squad as a junior.

Jelken, a 210-pound left guard, drew honorable mention recognition from the District coaches as a junior.

Seniors Dylan Thorson, and Jeremiah Dooyema bring more starting experience to the offensive front.

Thorson is a 250-pound right guard.

Dooyema is a 180-pound tight end, where junior Daniel Tofteland (200) is competing with the upper classman for playing tine.

Cade VerSteeg, a 240-pound left tackle, rounds out the returning starters on the line.

Luverne is inexperienced at the center position, where senior Matthew Schmuck (200) and sophomore Matthew Ziegler (175) are vying for playing time.

Other potential offensive linemen include seniors Knute Oldre (210) and Jon Diaz (185) and junior Tyler Fick (215).

"With a lot of starters coming

back, we're looking at our offensive line as being one of our obvious strengths going into the season," Oye said.

"We've got good size and a lot of experience, and they are a smart group of kids who work hard. I think it's a flexible line that can run and pass block equally well."

Luverne also returns two wide receivers with starting experience from the 2015 season.

Senior Layne Curtis (190) and junior Kasyn Kruse (165) received extended playing time as receivers last fall.

Seniors Matthew Hup (150) and Damian Reese (155) and juniorTuckerOeltjenbruns(140) are other potential receivers.

Although some Cardinals did receive limited playing time last year, Luverne is largely inexperienced in the offensive backfield.

Jake Haugen, a 170-pound sophomore, did run some plays as a quarterback last year.

Haugen and Ben Serie, a

155-pound sophomore, are expected to take the snaps from center in 2016.

Solomon Nielsen, a 180-pound senior, did get some carries as a fullback last season.

Nielsen is expected to start as a fullback in 2016, with seniors TannerWiese (165) and Will Natte (150) being potential fullbacks as well.

Both senior Cyris Halverson (160) and junior Declan Beers (170) received limited playing time as tailbacks in 2015 and they are battling each other for the starting position this year.

"Our biggest concern right now is our inexperience in the offensive backfield. We'll just have to see what our young quarterbacks can do and play to their strengths," Ove said.

"You always want to be balanced offensively, but we'll probably pass the ball a little more this year than we have in the past. That, of course, will be dictated by game situations."

Six starters return to Luverne's defensive unit this fall, including three on the defensive line.

Jelken returns as a starting defensive end, while VerSteeg and Stratton are back as starting tackles.

Dooyema is projected to be the other starting defensive end.

Natte is another potential defensive end, while Thorson and senior Tom Wiebe (375) are potential defensive tackles.

Beers returns as a starting outside linebacker on defense.

Daniel Tofteland is another potential outside linebacker, as is senior Riley Baker (160).

Nielsen and Curtis are projected to be inside linebackers.

Two players bring starting experience to the defensive secondary.

Kruse returns as a starting cornerback, while senior Andrew Reisch (160) is back as the starting safety.

Reese and junior Jayden Renken (160) are competing for the second cornerback position.

When the situation calls for a second safety, Curtis will move back into the secondary from his linebacker position.

"Defensively, I think we have a better group of tacklers than we've had in a while," Oye offered.

"I like our team speed on defense, and I think we are in front of where we have been in terms of adjusting from one defensive alignment to another. My biggest concern about our defense is our depth because we lack numbers in our junior and sophomore classes."

Jelken is expected to handle the kicking and punting duties for the second consecutive season.

Oye lists Jackson County Central as the team to beat in Section 3AAA, buthe believes the Huskies could be challenges by LHS, Fairmont and Sibley East.

One year after putting together the most successful season in program history, **Luverne girls'** cross country coach Pete Janiszeski isn't dwelling on the past.

He wants his Cardinals to be focused on the upcoming season, which could be equally rewarding if the athletes concentrate on the present.

"Last year is last year. We have to put it all together again this year," Janiszeski said.

"On paper, it looks as if we have some opportunities in front of us this year. We still have to try and get better and develop as a team."

In many ways 2015 was a dream season for the Cardinal girls.

LHS won its first Big South Conference Small Division title at the end of the regular season before winning the school's first Section 3A team championship in late October.

As if that wasn't enough for the

Cardinal runners, they solidified their position in LHS history by turning in a program-best fourthplace performance at the state meet in Northfield.

Considering the fact that LHS didn't lose a runner from last year's state and section teams, the Cardinals should be in store for more success in 2016.

With a talented 18-athlete roster consisting of six seniors, one junior, two sophomores, two freshmen, five eighth-graders and two seventh-graders, Janiszeski believes his team has the potential to thrive this fall.

"I've been here for 15 years now, and I don't remember a girls' team having as much depth as this one does," he said.

"We basically are 12 deep (in terms of potential varsity runners), and that's a good position to be in. The girls are competitive and they compete at a high level, so it should be fun to see what

happens this year."

All seven runners and both alternates who formed Luverne's

postseason team in 2015 are back in the ranks.
Luverne has one of the top run-

nersinthe state in senior Madison Schandelmeier. Along with winning the BSC

and Section 3A individual titles, Schandelmeier made the all-state team by leading LHS with an 18thplace finish at the state meet.

Sophomore Gabrielle Ferrell and eighth-grader Regan Feit form a pair of top-notch runners as well.

Ferrell, who has earned allstate status in the past, earned a spot on the All-BSC roster by placing third at the league meet last fall.

Ferrell placed fifth at the section meet and 40th at the state meet for the Cardinals last year, who are hoping she can overcome some health problems that stem back to last track season.

"My biggest concern right now is not having Gabi at full health,"

Janiszeski said.

"She has some muscle deficiencies right now, but we hope to get her on the course by the middle of September."

Feit emerged as one of Luverne's top runners as a seventh-grader last season.

Feit placed second at the conference meet, ninth at the section meet and 44th at the state meet during her first year as a varsity competitor.

Luverne also received some quality performances from sophomore Madison Reisdorfer and eighth-graders Autumn Nath and Cassie Flanagan in 2016.

Flanagan, Nath and Reisdorfer received honorable mention recognition for their efforts during the BSC meet.

Nath placed 22nd at the section meet and 112th at state, Reisdorfer finished 35th at the section meet

and 136th at state and Flanagan placed 56th at the section level and 160th at state.

Freshman Claire Baustian also competed in the postseason meets for LHS, finishing 65th at the section event and 147th at state.

The girls who ran in the postseason meets last year can expect to be challenged for their positions in the lineup in 2016.

Seniors Zayna Hustoft and Tianna Doppenberg served as alternates at the state and section meets one year ago, and they are potential varsity runners in 2016.

So is senior Mariah Aukes, who competed at a high level for LHS in the past before being sidelined with injury in 2015.

Senior Bergin Flom also has competed at the varsity level in the past, as has senior Carly Serie.

Rounding out the roster are junior Megan Rogers, freshman Madigan Flom, eighth-graders Solveig Tofteland and Leslie Van Engelenhoven and seventhgraders Brooklyn VerSteeg and Tenley Nelson.

"We definitely have the potential to be a pretty good team this year," Janiszeski said.

"We would like to duplicate what we accomplished last year and, hopefully improve on where we finished at state last year."

In order to make a return trip to state, the Cardinals need to realize they will be a team their opponents want to beat in 2016.

'Winning the section last year means we'll have a target on our backs, so the girls have to be ready to go right away," Janiszeski said.


"We are in one of the most competitive sections in the state on the girls' side, so we need to work hard and continue to improve."

The Cardinal boys face a different situation entering the 2016 season.

Unlike the girls, the LHS bovs' squad lost four seniors, including two section runners from the 2015 season.

"We'll need some boys to step up and help us out this year because we did lose two of our top seven runners from last season, Janiszeski said.

"We're not a very deep team, but we do have a good group of kids and most of them put in a lot of work over the summer."



The 5-7 Schmuck came off the bench as a defensive specialist in 2015, and her duties could include some setting this year.


Other players projected to make an impact on the court this season include senior Kami Sawtelle and juniors Rachel Oftedahl and Gracie Bosch.

Jodi Bents (middle hitter) and Mackenzie Wagner (outside hitter) were regulars in Adrian's starting lineup during their final year as members of the program.





Inexperience is obstackefng Adrian giddes

The Adrian High School football team needs to overcome an obstacle to find success on the gridiron in 2016.

With the AHS experiencing a large turnover in personnel, varsity experience is not on the Dragons' side as a new campaign approaches.

"We have a few kids with experience coming back, but we'll be playing a lot of good teams this year," said Dragon coach Randy Strand.

"It will be a challenge for us."
The challenge stems from losing nine seniors from the 2015 season.

Six of last year's seniors were two-way starters for AHS, and another served as a starting linebacker on defense.

With the seniors leading the way, Adrian put together a solid

7-4 campaign last fall.

The Dragons went 4-3 and tied for fourth place in the Southwest District West Sub-District during a 5-3 regular season.

A 5-3 record was good enough to give AHS the second seed for the Section 3A Playoffs, which started with the Dragons securing wins over Sleepy Eye (33-6) and Sleepy Eye St. Mary's (34-24) to earn a berth in the section championship game for the ninth consecutive season.

Adrian, however, dropped a 32-15 decision to Tracy-Milroy-Balaton in the title tilt, ending a 7-2 campaign and keeping the Dragons out of the state playoffs for the fourth consecutive year.

The list of nine seniors who capped their AHS careers against T-M-B includes four All-District performers.

fensive tackle/linebacker) and Skylar Hieronimus (wing back/ linebacker) graced the All-District roster at season's end.

Hunter Heitkamp, a senior who started as a defensive end and a wide receiver, drew honorable mention honors from District officials.

Gavin Engelkes, another 2015 senior, served as a starting offensive tackle and defensive tackle before being sidelined with an injury late in the season.

Logan Nelson started as a linebacker during his senior season, while classmates Jade Swank and Greg Kern were key reserves who made positive contributions to the team.

"The big thing was losing Rogers, who was our starting quarterbackforfouryears. I think he didn't start one game during those four years," Strand offered.

"The other guys played good football over the years for us, too. They played in a lot of (section championship) games on the turf in Marshall, which a lot of teams can't say. We just didn't get over the hump in those championship games."

While Adrian will be thin on experience in the offensive backfield and at the receiver position this year, the Dragons do have battle-tested athletes returning to the offensive line.

Seniors Mitchell Wagner, Zach Bierman and Zach Loosbrock and freshman Lance Luettel have varsity experience on the line.

Wagner, a 205-pound guard, returns as the starting right guard after drawing honorable mention recognition from District officials in 2015.



from being Adrian's manager the last two years to being a runner in 2016.

Other members of the programinclude freshman Annika Elias, eighth-grader Karis Barr and seventh-graders Abbey Leopold and Ashlee Christians.

"Our goals for the year are to place in the top five teams at the section meet and get two individuals to qualify for state," Kiers said.

"Then again, you never know. We might come up with a pleasant surprise as a team or individually and have more kids move on to

With a low participation rate, the Adrian boys will be hardpressed to field a complete varsity team in 2016.

A total of five athletes have reported to practice sessions of the preseason, which means all five would need to run at the varsity level in order for AHS to record a team score at meets.

That's not going to happen unless more athletes join the program prior to or during the

"It might become more of an individual thing for our boys this year," Kiers said.



"The boys might have to push themselves to become better individually and not worry about the team aspect. I think that could be a good thing.

The AHS boys did compete as a team in 2015, placing fourth at the conference meet and finishing 18th out of 21 teams at the section event.

Unfortunately for AHS, two of the six runners who ran at the section and conference meets last fall opted not to participate in the program in 2015.

Adrian's five-athlete roster at the beginning of the season includes one junior, one sophomore, one freshman, one eighthgrader and one seventh-grader.

The list includes one All-RRC performer and a total of four members of the 2015 section

squad.

Junior Brady Henning is the top returning runner.

Along with making the All-RRC squad last fall, Henning turned in a strong 23rd-place finish at the section meet.

"Brady has run a lot over the summer and he's ready to go right now," Kiers said.

"If I remember right, a lot of seniors finished in front of him at the section meet, so he might have a chance to qualify for state this year. The other three boys who ran at the section meet last year are experienced runners."

Sophomore Christian Weidert, freshman Caleb Hornstein and eighth-grader Brody Loosbrock bring 2015 section experience to the team.

Weidert placed 89th, Loosbrock 110th and Hornstein 133rd at the section event.

Seventh-grader Josh Barr rounds out the roster, but Kiers believes he is a year or two away from making an impact at the varsity level.

"All of the boys have set individual goals for themselves in terms of times. That will help them push themselves," Kiers concluded.

The 175-pound Bierman comes back as the starting right guard, while the 185-pound Loosbrock is switching positions in 2016.

Loosbrock started at center last fall, but he's projected to be the left guard this season.

Luettel, a 270-pound left tackle, gained most of his experience when Engelkes was injured late last season.

Junior Skylar Polzine (250) is expected to be the starting center. Strand is looking at a pair of seniors to fill out the line as tight

ends. Mitchell Lonneman (210) did gain some experience as a reserve offensive lineman last fall.

Lonneman and Alex Loosbrock (195) are projected to be tight ends for AHS in 2016.

Reserve linemen include seniors Evan Swank (185), Dylan Werkman (215) and Kasey Madtson (200), junior Chance Turner (185) and sophomore Skyler Dingmann (190).

"I think we're a little bigger on the line than we were last year," Strand said.

"The verdict is still out on this group. We'll find out if they can play during the season."

The balance of the offensive unit is less experienced with the exception of seniors Dylan Gyberg, Frank Serrao and Landon Rogers.

Gyberg (200) and Landon Rogers (160) received starts at the fullback position in 2016.

The 170-pound Serrao started at times as halfback.

Some more athletes are pushing for playing time at the fullback, wing back and tail back positions this year.

Strand said junior Nick Harder (195), a transfer student from Luverne, can play in all three of those positions.

Junior Brendyn White (140) is a potential tailback, as is sopho-

more Dakota John (160). AHS will be inexperienced at the quarterback and wide re-

ceiver positions this fall. SeniorZachHendel(170)is expected to be Adrian's top receiver, while junior Ryan Wieneke (195) is the team's quarterback.

"Ryan has a little experience, but not a lot of it at the varsity level," Strand said.

"He's a tall (6-5), lanky kid who throws a good football. I just don't know how much throwing we'll do this year because I'm hoping we can pound the ball this year. We'll line up in different formations, try to overload one side of the line in some instances and try to get our kids in the right places so they can succeed. Hopefully, we'll be able to gain some yardage on the ground."

Unlike the offensive line, experience is something Adrian lacks on the defensive front.

Wagner, a defensive tackle, is the lone returning starter on the line.

Zach Loosbrock is expected to be the other starting defensive tackle, while Lonneman and Leuttel are projected to be starting defensive ends.

Other potential defensive linemen include Madtson, Turner, Swank, Polzine and Werkman.

Two of the four projected starting linebackers bring experience to the table.

Gyberg returns as a starting insidelinebacker, while Bierman, who started as a defensive end in 2015, is expected to play as an outside linebacker this fall.

Harder is expected to start as an inside linebacker and Logan Rogers as an outside linebacker.

John is another potential line-

Wieneke and Serrao return as starting cornerbacks in Adrian's secondary, while Alex Loosbrock is projected to be the safety.

White and junior Michael Preuss (140) could play in the secondary as well.

"I don't think we're as big as we need to be on defense, but we may be able to make up for it with quickness," Strand said.

"We have a few kids coming back with experience on defense, but we'll be playing with new kids in a lot of positions."

Strand lists Minneota, Canby, Lakeview and Lac qui Parley Valley as being the top teams in a competitive district this fall.

"We'll be playing a lot of good teams in the regular season and it will be a challenge for us," he said.

"I just want to see us get better with every game. When it becomes playoff time, we want to be playing our best football."



do it the right way. I like the way things have been going so far."

Albrecht inherits a team that struggled last season.

The Panthers went 1-25 during the regular season, which includes a 0-10 mark in the Red Rock Conference.

Ellsworth ended the campaign with a 1-26 record after dropping a 3-0 decision to Southwest Christian during the opening round of the South Section 3A Tournament.

Three senior players capped their EHS careers at the end of the 2015 campaign.

Megan Popkes, an all-around player, drew honorable mention honors from the RRC coaches at the end of her senior season.

Maggie Kruse started for the Panthers as well.

Sharlene Heikes is another member of the 2015 squad.

Losing three players will make a big impact on the 2016 team, which is short on numbers this year.

Volleyball is a sport that requires six players to be on the court at all times, and EHS starts the season with an eight-player varsity roster.

The list includes two seniors, two juniors, three sophomores and one freshman.

With Albrecht being a physical education instructor, she wants her players to be well conditioned in order to survive the rigors of a long season with a limited roster.

"We've being working their skills and things like weightlifting and cardio vascular stuff," she said.

"Hopefully it will help the girls jump high, hit the ball harder and get them physically ready for the season. We're also working on things like sportsmanship team building. We want the kids encouraging each other, not getting mad at each other."

As seniors, Albrecht is looking for Hannah Kramer and Hailee Nolte to be the leaders of the squad.

Kramer, a 5-6 left-side hitter, is a returning starter from the 2015 squad.

Nolte is a 5-4 left-side hitter with past experience as well.

Kramer, Dreesen and Smith have stood out with their abilities to attack the ball at the net.
