Steen land sale sets new record

Eighty acres of land near Steen sold for \$19,000 per acre Thursday morning, topping Rock County's previous land sale record of \$16,200 per acre in November 2012.

"It just blew me out of the water," said Tom Houselog of the Rock County Land Records Office. "The biddingstarted at \$12,000 and went to \$19,000 in a matter of a few minutes."

The successful bidder was Steen farmer Matt Boeve, who lives directly across the road (Highway 270) from the 80-acre parcel, which sold for a total of \$1,520,000.

Houselog said the tract of land, all tillable ground, is among the best and most fertile in Rock County, but he was still surprised by the record sale, due to dropping commodity prices.

"With prices half of what they were at their highest, I didn't know how the market would react," Houselog said.

"But it's just one sale. ... It could have been \$9,000 instead of \$19,000 and would that mean the market is tanking? Again, it's just one sale, and it's hard to know what motivated the bidders.

He said one factor that drives up land auction prices is proximity to adjacent ground, especially if more than one bidder shares that interest.

While Thursday's land sale is a record-breaker, Houselog said the implications for land values in the neighborhood will not be. "It's only one of several sales we'll be looking at for our 2017 assessments," Houselog said.

The highest-priced land so far in 2015 was 56 acres in Springwater Township that sold in April to the Hoogland Trust for \$13,850 per acre.

The highest price in 2014 was \$15,250 per acre in Kanaranzi Township, and in 2013 the high sale was \$15,300 in Kanaranzi Township.

Until Thursday, the all-time record sale in Rock County was in Beaver Creek Township in 2012 when Eric Fick bought 80 acres for \$16,200 per acre. The land had been in the Walter and Leora Hellwinckel family for 85 years.

"It was such an extreme sale, I didn't know what to take away from it," Houselog said about Thursday's land auction.



Shirley Walraven will retire Dec. 31 after 38 years of employment at the Exchange State Bank of Hills.

Walraven grew up in Pipestone. She started working for a certified public accounting firm in Pipestone after graduation. When she and Robert Walraven married, she moved to Hills where she worked with Dora Steffen doing income tax.

Shirley said she wanted a job in town so she didn't have to travel. Dennis Roning was the president of the bank in Hills and hired her to work part time. Other $employees at that time were \, Gene$ Sundem, Dorothy Thorin and Carol Nelson.

She worked at the bank when it was located on the corner of Main Street and 2nd Avenue.

Walraven said she has fond memories of her early years with the bank.

"The bank at the corner downtown was unique in its own way," she said.

"In the winter when there was a wind from the north, it blew snow in through the windows on the north side. The bathroom was a closet made into a bathroom."

She recalled the building being in poor shape.

'We sometimes had mice," she said. "That building was pretty old. One thing we would comment about was the hole in the floor where Dennis Roning sat at his desk. We always wondered if we would ever lose Dennis to the basement." When Rodney Bonander bought the bank, Walraven worked full time. When asked what changes have occurred in the banking industry, she said, "Lots of computer and more all the time. Regulations have also become a task to stay ahead of." She also commented on economic times. "I've seen interest rates on deposits go as high as 16 percent," she said. Some of Walraven's favorite memories revolve around her work relationships. "I have been very fortunate to have worked for some great bosses — Dennis Roning, Rod Bonander and Tim Plimpton. Also there have been great co-

workers through all the years," she said.

"You kind of become a family with all the hours you spend together. I will miss them all. ... I will also miss visiting with the public."

In her retirement Walraven said she plans on spending time with family and traveling.

School levy to increase by 12.73 percent

The Hills-Beaver Creek School District levied the maximum amount allowed by the state, \$1,427,158.75, which is a 12.73-percent increase over last year's levy.

One of the contributing factors for the increase is the district's new ability to levy for facility maintenance. This was newly created by the 2015 legislative session.

Last year's levy was \$1,266,051.97.

District Auditor Matt Taubert of Meulebroeck, Taubert, and Co., PLLP, Pipestone, pre-

sented the audit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2015, at the H-BC School Board meeting Monday, Dec. 14.

In other business, the board:

•canceled the regularly scheduled school board meeting on Monday, Dec. 28.

•approved Meghan Leuthold as a student teacher under Shelly Fischer in the kindergarten room the last

semester of the school year. approved Kendra Doerr and Heather Doerr for a four-week practicum to work in a variety of classrooms as paraprofessionals at H-BC elementary.

•heard that art teacher Mary Petersen was awarded a grant with Southwest Minnesota Arts Council for \$4,000 through the state's Legacy Fund.

•noted that H-BC Foundation will host an event Tuesday, Dec. 29, at the high school.

•heard that Logan Leuthold, Isaiah Vis and Cooper Vaughn were named to the all area football team by the Worthington Globe.



Girls clobber Panthers

The Hills-Beaver Creek girls' basketball team posted their fourth victory of the season whenthey dismantled Ellsworth 72-50 in Ellsworth Thursday.

H-BC outscored the Panthersin both halves of the game and led by as many as 30 points before settling with a 22-point victory.

The score was knotted at four in the first half when H-BC scored 10 consecutive points as a part of an 18-2 run that left the Patriots sporting a 22-6 lead when Mekayla Kolbrek buried a pair of free throws at the 8:56 mark.

The Patriots extended their lead to 19 points (27-8) when Kourtney Rozeboom delivered a field goal at 6:21, but the Panthers countered with a 10-2 run to make it a 29-18 game with 2:46 remaining in the stanza.

H-BC ended the half with a 12-4 surge ending with a three-point shot by Jasmine Lingen with 29 seconds left to give the Patriots a 41-22 advantage they would take into the second half.

The Patriots scored the first nine points of the second half to make it a 51-22 game when Avery Van Roekel converted a threepoint play 3:22 into the stanza.

H-BC led by 30 points (57-27) when Lingen recorded a field goal at 12:15, but that proved to be the biggest lead the Patriots would sport in the contest.

Ellsworth trimmed the difference to 19 points (68-49) with less than two minutes remaining before falling by 22 points at game's end.

Rozeboom (18 points and five rebounds), Van Roekel (14 points and six rebounds), Sidney Fick (13 points and 10 rebounds) and Grace Bundesen (10 points) played key roles in the win.

Lingen added nine rebounds and three assists to the cause, while Paige Tilstra chipped in five assists and four steals.

H-BC, which trailed by as many as 18 points in the second half and faced a 16-point deficit at the intermission, didn't give up the fight.

The Patriots came roaring back in the second half to trim the difference to two points with 4:35 left to play.

Luverne, however, answered the challenge by outscoring the hosts 15-5 the rest of the night to secure a 63-51 victory.

Trailing 37-21 entering the second half, H-BC scored the first four points of the stanza during a 7-2 spurt ending with a threepoint shot from Zach Scholten to

make it a 39-28 game with 14:01 left to play.

game against Luverne. H-BC dropped a 63-51 decision to the Cardinals.

Luverne increased its lead to 12 points (44-32) moments later, but the Patriots countered with a 14-4 run ending with Scholten hitting one free throw at the 4:35 mark to make it a 48-46 contest.

H-BC led 11-10 when Luverne scored five consecutive points to move in front 15-11.

A 7-0 run ending with H-BC's Dylan Forshey sinking one free throw with 1:13 remaining made it a 34-21 game, but LHS hit a three-point shot late in the half to open a 16-point advantage at the intermission.


