Seller's market

Assessed values in Luverne increase as demand for housing continues on pace

The tight housing market in Luverne ispushing property values higher, according to Rock County Assessor Tom Houselog. "It's certainly a seller's market," he said.

"A bunch of homes sold for more than they were valued at. When you have a supply that doesn't meet demand, when they do sell, they sell for a lot of money.... We had to adjust market values based on those sales."

Houselog presented information to City Council members May 15 at the annual **Board of Appeal** and Equalization meeting in city hall.

The 2018 market values on current property statements are based on 77 residential housing sales between Oct. 1,

2016, and Sept. 30, 2017.

A single level 1970s era home valued at \$156,000 sold for \$195,000 in March. Another in that same class sold for \$145,000 around that same time and it had been valued at \$129,000.

In June, a 1930s era home valued at \$85,000 sold for \$136,000, and in August, a two-story, 1910 era home valued at \$151,200 sold for \$205,000.

Residential market values overall in Luverne increased by a total of nearly 13 percent, with increases ranging from 5 to 25 percent.

"When you increase the valuation of a \$300,000 home by that much, you're talking a significant number," Houselog said.

Several residents appealed their valuations and Houselog presented information to the City Council Tuesday night for possible adjustments on six parcels.

The important message for property owners, Houselog said, is that the market value increases won't necessarily translate to a property tax increase.

Property taxes are affected by a number of other factors, including the voter approved operating levy in the Luverne School District and general tax levies of all local governments.

Students take field trip to Blue Mounds State Park

Park naturalist Amber Brooks measures fun and learning with a simple yardstick: If you don't have grass stains or dirt on your clothes, you didn't have fun and you didn't learn anything.

More than 150 students from Luverne, Hills-Beaver Creek and Ellsworth spent an afternoon last week at the Blue Mounds State Park north of Luverne

where dirt and grass stains prevailed. Temperatures were in the 80s and skies were sunny Thursday, May 17, when 100 Luverne first-graders took their field trip to the park.

Brooks introduced students to "Chuck," the garter snake and encouraged them to pretend they were snakes and move across the grass without using their arms or legs. Many students just wiggled in place.

She also told them not to laugh at her dumb joke. "What is brown and sticky?" she asked. "A

Many students laughed. They learned about other animals through their fur from Luverne's Matt Buntjer, a member of the Minnesota Trappers Association, who showed them hides from a coyote, wolf, brown bear, possum and skunk. "Many students didn't touch the skunk,"

Buntjer said. **Śtudents also learned about** bison, completed a nature hike, explored tee pees and climbed on rock formations in the park.

The goals of the experience were to learn about local wildlife and to enjoy the outdoors.

Hardwick tackles junk

Fifteen tons of metal and other materials were removed from a Hardwick property Friday morning with its owner facing the cleanup charges.

James Petersen of Jasper failed to comply with Hardwick's nuisance ordinance that regulates storing unusable items around a storage shed at 301 Ross Street South.

Petersen was fined \$1,000 earlier this year under the ordinance adopted two years ago.

With the nuisance charge, city officials are now about to assess clean upexpenses and associated administrative fees to the property because of Petersen's failure to comply.

Cleanup expenses (without the fine) are \$2,300 and growing, according to city clerk Tammy Johnson.

impounded and is not included in the expenses.

Hardwick adopted its nuisance ordinance in March 2016 and sent a half dozen property owners letters stating their properties were in violation.

Petersen was sent another letter in September 2017 before being fined under the nuisance ordinance

DNR, city install floating dock at The Lake

Just in time for summer fishing season, the city of Luverne and the state of Minnesota installed a new floating dock at The Lake on West Edgehill Street last week.

The city applied last year to the Minnesota DNR for a grant to build the disability-accessible 64-foot-long wooden dock with railings and benches.

Windom DNR technician Jason Honkomp headed up the project, with help from Blue Mounds State Park staff, city public works and local volunteer Mike Davis.

"It's a nice spot where it should require only minimum maintenance," Honkomp said. There's little wind and good fishing."

The \$25,000 structure was funded primarily through the Federal Emergency Management Agency to replace a floating dock at the Blue Mounds State Park.

The 2014 flood destroyed the dam and drained the Lower Mound Lake, and in the process ruined the park's

floating dock.

When the state and federal officials decided against replacing the dam and lake, they determined the new dock would be located at The Lake in Luverne.

The city contributed \$10,000 toward the project and assisted DNR staff with

installation.

The dock is among nearly \$200,000 worth of improvements the city has invested in that area to clean up blight and to improve the shoreline and its public access.

City Administrator John Call said the process began more than five years ago when

the area looked more like a junkyard than a beach.

Mike and Traci Davis own the northeast portion of The Lake area and the city owns the north shore.

Working with the Davises and other interested parties, the city has graded the area for public parking and added grass and Sioux quartzite boulders and other amenities for public enjoyment.

"We worked with them and the DNR and it snowballed into a beautiful green area that we decided to put some money into," Call said. "It's for anybody in town who wants to enjoy it."

Another incentive for the improvements is the fact that the Luverne Loop trail will go past The Lake, and plans call for additional trailhead improvements when that happens.

According to the grant agreement with the DNR, the city will be responsible for maintaining the dock and will provide free and adequate parking — including a disability parking space.

Beaver Creek, Hardwick earn wastewater award

The cities of Beaver Creek and Hardwick were recognized recently for their efforts to comply with the state's wastewater permit program.

They were among 295 Minnesota treatment facilities recognized for maintaining outstanding permit compliance from October 2016 through September 2017.

To be eligible for the recognition, wastewater treatment facilities submitted all reports to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency correctly and on time, demonstrated consistent compliance through monitoring, operations and maintenance, and employ staff certified by the MPCA in wastewater operations.

The award was presented at the 81st Annual Wastewater Operations Conference in Brooklyn Park. The annual conference brings together wastewater operators from Minnesota for training and professional education

In Minnesota there are about 1,600 municipal and industrial wastewater treatment facilities.

'I Rocked the River'

Rock River tour set for June 30; event includes 'after row party'

More than 100 people paddled the Rock River last year for the Rock River canoe and kayak tour.

The event was part of a yearlong celebration of Luverne's 150th anniversary, but local water enthusiasts are hoping to make it an annual event.

This year's event, "I Rocked the River" water trail ride, is set for June 30, and the group is accepting reservations on a first-come, first-served basis.

Registration materials are available at the Luverne Area Chamber office at 213 E. Luverne Street or online at luvernechamber.com.

The river trip will be three to six hours, depending on how fast travelers paddle on the river and how long the stops are.

Departure times are 9:30, 10, 10:30, 11, 11:30 and 12 noon from the grassy lot east of the Luverne City Park where transportation will be provided to an entry point upstream.

Entry points upstream will be determined by June 15, depending on the depth and speed of the river.

Groups of roughly 30 people will depart at a time, and paddlers can choose to get out of the river either before or after the rapids, which are between Main Street and the railroad bridge to the south.

Those who bring their own canoes and kayaks should come 90 minutes early to allow time to load them.

The trip on the river includes two

stops — one about an hour out for a drink of water and snack, and another for a catered lunch. Both stops will have portable bathroom facilities available.

It costs \$30 per person to participate, or \$20 each for those who use their own canoes and kayaks.

All participants must wear life jackets and shoes and all must sign waivers.

Children under 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

Paddlers are encouraged to bring sunscreen, sunglasses, hats and other items for comfort, and they can bring their own snacks and beverages, as long as they aren't in glass containers.

Emergency staff will be available both on the river and on land if needed, with an emergency contact number of 507-920-5197.

Farmers urged to report prevented planting, failed acres

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds producers to report prevented planting and failed acres in order to establish or retain FSA program eligibility.

Producers must report crop acreage they intended to plant, but due to natural disaster, they were prevented from planting.

Prevented planting acreage must be reported on form FSA-576, Notice of Loss, no later than 15 calendar days after the final planting date as established by FSA and the Risk Management

Late-filed reports will only be accepted if FSA conducts a farm visit to assess the eligible disaster condition that prevented the crop from being planted.

A measurement service fee will be charged.

Additionally, producers with failed acres should also use form FSA-576, Notice of Loss, to report failed acres.

For losses on crops covered by the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program and crop insurance, producers must file a Notice of Loss within 15 days of the

occurrence of the disaster or when losses become apparent.

Producers must timely file a Notice of Loss for failed acres on all crops including grasses.

I fiddled with the two, long, smooth wooden eating utensils. My companions continued to

One suggested using chopsticks might be the weight-loss plan I've been looking for. All claimed, "It's not that hard," and continued to enjoy the delicious Chinese food.

Morning arrived and with it breakfast. A travelling companion, deftly downing scrambled eggs, assured me I'd be snapping flies out of the air with chopsticks in no time. I just wanted breakfast, never mind snapping the flies.

I learned it's not rude in China to put one's face over one's plate and shovel food into one's mouth. Hunger drove me to adopt this technique.

Solution to child care shortage possible with continued collaboration

It's likely you have heard something about the shortage of child care in the news. Communities all around greater Minnesota are sharing similar stories; there are not enough childcare openings in or near where families live and work.

This should be of concern not only to parents trying to find child care but to all of us. Child care is an essential service necessary in a community for healthy growth.

Young families looking to move into a community need a house, a job and child care, with most families having two working parents. You takeaway child care and a house will be purchased in another community and a job filled at another site. This will ripple into empty desk space in our schools, less patronage in our business sector and a community with a population that will only age and not be replaced by the next generation of residents.

We are no different from any other community in Minnes ot a that isstruggling with child care availability. In-home providers in Rock County are down by over 20 homes in the last two years with the average provider keeping an open door for only five years. We currently do not have a childcare center model to help fill this gap.

Over the last five months the Luverne Area Community Foundation facilitated conversations over this issue. In an attempt to help find the best solution for our community, a very thoughtful process was implemented by a child care task force committee.

including current providers, local leadership and a child care business consultant, we held community conversations.

First to sit around the table was local leadership from city, county, school board, state and even some interested federal representation. We wanted to make sure they knew that this problem was speeding toward crisis and their attention to whatever they could do to help was going to be needed.

We spent a night with current in-home providers. We listened to their concerns and stories and offered a business plan continuing education course to empower them to remember they are a business, an essential part of our community, not a babysitting service.

We wanted to know how business owners are affected by child care shortages for hiring and staffing, so we met for an after-hours social and listened some more.

Our conversations are drawing attention. Positive attention. Minnesota Sen. Bill Weber has taken these conversations to the legislature and has co-authored the start of some reform to the current state regulations on child care. U.S. Sen. Tina Smith and

Congressman Tim Walz have each asked to be part of a conversation in our community about the concerns and needs of this shortage.

 $While I am \, encouraged \, by what is \,$ happening as more people continue this conversation, my bigger concern is what is going to happen right here in Rock County.

What can things look like six months, one year and five years from now? We have new industry moving in soon with new jobs and potential new residents. How are we going to ensure that they choose Luverne or a community within the county to live, rather than be a commuter to a job?

This community never ceases to amaze me. There is a wealth of leadership, vision, selfless acts and financial support for the things we name as important to the vitality of our community.

I am convinced that child care will soon take its spot on the "projects with solutions" shelf, but it's going to take leadership, vision, selfless acts and financial support in a collaborative effort to get it done.

This isn't just a problem for working parents with young children; it's a problem for all of us who call this community home.

REMEMBER WHEN

10 years ago (2008)

• The high price and low supply of steel is causing Rock County Commissioners to consider postponing a major project — the Rock River Bridge reconstruction.

The Rock River Bridge crosses the river on Luverne's Main Street.

The lowest of three bids for the bridge was from Duininck Brothers for \$2.39 million, but the company cannot get steel beams until January.

Short supplies have been an ongoing issue for contractors this year, and prices have steadily increased since last year. Structural steel is costing the bridge project \$539,172.

25 years ago (1993)

•Thanks to the Minnesota Legislature and Gov. Arne Carlson, Minnesota communities will continue to be part of the planning for the Lewis and Clark Rural Water System Project.

City Administrator Doug Bunkers reported to the Luverne City Council Monday that the Legislature and the governor authorized \$28,000 for a grant to fund the plans and system design for the project. Lewis and Clark proposes to bring Missouri River water to southwest Minnesota. Luverne, Worthington, Lincoln/ Pipestone Rural Water and Rock County Rural Water are the Minnesota participants. Communities in northwest Iowa and Eastern South Dakota would also be customers.

Southwest Regional Development is authorized to study the feasibility and need for the project before the state commits \$3.5 to \$4 million for construction. The Council approved appointing Bunkers and Utility Coordinator Red Arndt as delegate and alternate, respectively, to the Lewis and Clark Rural Water System.

50 years ago (1968)

•It was learned yesterday afternoon that indications pointed to the strong possibility that a mandamus action would be brought against the city of Luverne. The purpose of the action, it was said, would be to halt further razing of what is left of the old fire and city hall.

One supporter of the mandamus action said that, in his opinion, that the building was too good to tear down and that with a modest expenditure of money it could be made into a suitable police station.

The razing of the city hall and fire hall was part of the master plan for providing additional, convenient downtown parking for people who wanted quick access to business places

It was learned that the two signers required to bring a mandamus action had been secured and that formal notice would be served on the city official yesterday afternoon.

75 years ago (1943)

•Settling one's differences while on horseback was once a common occurrence, but using an automobile to prove a point is believed to be the most current example of forceful argumentation on municipal court records here.

On April 25, Oliver Skyberg, formerly of Luverne but now of Sioux Falls, allegedly drove up behind Ralph Jensen, Luverne, who was also driving on U.S. 75 near Luverne, and "bumped" into the rear end of the Jensen car. The Jensen car went into the ditch and was damaged.

According to Richard Torrison, who acted as Skyberg's attorney, Skyberg agreed to have the Jensen car repaired, but after he returned to Sioux Falls, he became ill, and didn't return to make settlement until Sunday.

He was too late, however, for Jensen then filed a complaint against him, and when he appeared here Sunday, he was taken into custody by Sheriff Roberts before he had a chance to see Jensen. Taken before Municipal Judge Main, he pleaded guilty to a charge of reckless driving, and was fined \$40 and costs amounting to \$7.30. He was also required to deposit \$50 with the court to guarantee payment of the cost of repairing the Jensen car.

100 years ago (1918)

•Hon. John G. Woolley, for many years a national figure in the Anti-Saloon League movement, who is referred to by thousands of admirers throughout this country as "the great American," will deliver his famous address, "When Good Men Rule the World," at the New Palace theatre on next Wednesday evening, May 29th, commencing at 8 o'clock.

The meeting will be in the nature of a patriotic dry rally, and everyone, regardless of his individual views on the temperance question, is invited to be present. There will be no admission charge.



Some landscape 'weeds' actually tree samplings, easy to pull

Working in my landscape, I notice that the majority of my "weeds" are actuallytree seedlings. 1 see that to



be a fact in many landscapes.

Pulling those tree seedlings when they are small is not difficult. The trick is to pull it out, not pull it off. If you didn't get some root with the stem, it will regrow. Then you will have an established root system with a tender top and it will be much harder to pull.

Sometimes I can use my pruning shears to pry it out. If you are using a pruning shears, and you choose to cut it off, cut it below the soil surface deep enough to get some root ... getting some root is the key to getting rid of the tree.

You have to be observant to detect these seedlings ... the green often camouflages them with the good plant and they can get pretty big before they become obvious.

I am seeing tent caterpillars in flowering crab trees and remind you to just pull the web nest out of the tree if you can

reach it. If you do that early in the morning or late evening, all the critters are in the web and you can squash it with your foot. If it is up higher in the tree, you may have to use an insecticide spray to get rid of them. That spray stream is directed at the nest area during the day while the worms are out feeding.

A butterfly (moth) lays an eggmass on a host tree branch, the eggs hatch into a clutch of hungry worms, and they feed on the leaves until they reach maturity. The caterpillars recycle back to butterflies and the process continues with lots more the second and successive rounds. The tree is not necessarily harmed by this feeding activity but they can defoliate a considerable area and then you have the issue of each successive cycle producing more of the critters.

If you haven't already used a systemic fertilizer on your shrub roses, I recommend doing that immediately.

The formulation of fertilizer is perfect, and the systemic insecticide will take care of the



little green worms that can defoliate the small rose bush in a few days. This product gets reapplied in six weeks, so mark on your calendar when to make the next application so you don't miss it.

The winter was hard on many shrubs, and roses were no exception. This fertilizer will give them the boost they need to regain their strength and vigor.

Sadly, our daffodils and

tulips have about finished their glorious spring color show so be sure to clip off the dead flower stems to prevent the formation of seed heads. Remember that the leaves have to stay until they begin to turn yellow. Now is when that flower bulb is building the flower bud in the bulb for next year. If you remove the foliage too soon, you will only get leaves in the next season.







NOTICE SPECIAL EDUCATION RECORDS **RETENTION PROCEDURES**

In accordance with the state and federal regulations implementing the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), the Luverne Public School is providing notification of the intent to destroy personally identifiable information related to inactive **special education** records dated prior to 2009/2010.

Beginning July 1, 2018, the Luverne School District will retain special education records for students with disabilities for a period of five years beyond the student's 21st birthday. Parents and eligible students will be notified of this practice at the time the student is:

- a. dismissed from special education services
- b. graduates from school, or

c. ages out of school. Students/legal guardianship will be asked to sign an acknowledgement (Notice of Special Education File Retention Procedure) of the district's procedure to destroy the **special education** records five years after their 21st birthday. No further notice will be given at the end of the five years. Achievement, standardized tests and academic records will continue to be maintained as permanent records.

Special education records for students that services have ended prior to 2009/2010 or students who have left the school system more than seven years ago may pick up their records by arranging a time with the District Office at (507) 283-8088 by July 1. An individual 18 years of age or older, unless adjudicated, must request his/her own records. Proper identification and signature of authorized recipient is required.

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

Comments, petitions, and other requests must be received at the MPCA in writing on or before the public comment period end date and time identified above.

Description of Agri-Energy LLC

Agri-Energy LLC produces fuel ethanol, isobutanol and Distiller's Dried Grain and Solubles (DDGS) from corn. Pollutants emitted include volatile organic compounds (VOC), particulate matter (PM), particulate matter smaller than 10 microns (PM10), particulate matter smaller than 2.5 microns (PM2.5), nitrogen oxides (NOx), sulfur dioxide (SO2), carbon monoxide (CO), hazardous air pollutants (HAP) and greenhouse gases (GHG). Sources of emissions from the facility include grain receiving and handling, fermentation, distillation, DDGS production, dry fractionation processes, storage and handling, product and denaturant storage and loadout, and leaks from piping connections.

The facility employs a thermal oxidizer (RTO) to control VOC emissions from DDGS drying, fermentation and distillation processes. Wet scrubbers also control emissions from the fermentation and distillation processes. The facility employs baghouses to control particulate emissions. The large product storage tanks are equipped with internal floating roofs to control VOC. The ethanol loadout rack for trucks is equipped with a vapor recovery system which vents to an RTO to control VOC. Emissions from equipment leaks are controlled through an inspection and maintenance program.

Agri-Energy proposes to install additional equipment in order to increase isobutanol production while simultaneously producing ethanol. Agri-Energy will both modify some control equipment and install new equipment, including a new fermentation and distillation scrubber to replace existing fermentation and distillation scrubbers. New equipment will initially vent to the existing scrubbers; however, this equipment will eventually route to the new scrubbers once they are installed. Agri-Energy proposes the ability to bypass emissions to the RTO by venting fermentation and distillation processes to the atmosphere after control by each respective scrubber. Normal operation would be to have the RTO control in series with the fermentation and distillation scrubbers. Agri-Energy also proposes raising some emission limits for certain units including the RTO. Agri-Energy is also removing the use of propane fuel onsite.

A separate major amendment is included to install equipment for a dry fractionation process. This involves the installation of new equipment including but not limited to fractionation units, separation units, conveyors, surge and storage bins, two dust collectors and baghouse.

This permit action also includes an administrative and major amendment, both for a test extension on VOC (administrative) and VOC, PM and PM10 (major) for the RTO. This performance test has since been conducted.

Procedure for public participation

As stated in Minn. R. chs. 7000 and 7001, there are three formal procedures for public participation in the MPCA's consideration of this matter. Interested persons may:

- Petition the MPCA to hold a contested case hearing.

Submitting written comments

To submit comments or petitions to the MPCA through the mail or email, you must state:

- (1) Your interest in the permit application or the draft permit. The action you wish the MPCA to take, including specific references to
- the section of the draft permit you believe should be changed.
- The reasons supporting your position, stated with sufficient specificity as to allow the MPCA to investigate the merits of the position.

Public informational meeting

A public informational meeting is an informal meeting during which interested persons can ask questions concerning the proposed facility. MPCA staff will be present to provide information. If an interested person would like the MPCA to hold a public informational meeting, the person should include all information identified above and in addition include a statement of the reasons the person desires the MPCA to hold a public informational meeting and the issues that the person would like the agency to address at the public informational meeting.

Contested Case Hearing

A contested case hearing is a formal proceeding before an administrative law judge empowered to advise the MPCA regarding issues of fact. As described in Minn. R. 7000.1800, persons who submit petitions for a contested case hearing must also state the issues they propose to address in a contested case hearing, the specific relief requested or resolution of the matter, and the reasons (which may be in the form of proposed findings) supporting an MPCA decision to hold a contested case hearing. Failure to comply with these rules exactly may result in a denial of the request. To the extent known, the petitioner may also submit a list of prospective witnesses to be called at a hearing, a proposed list of publications, references, or studies to be introduced at a hearing and the approximate time required for the petitioner to present the matter at a hearing. The decision whether to hold a contested case hearing will be made under Minn. R. 7000.1900. (5-24)
