Positive attitudes lift spirits of H-BC track coach

Hills-Beaver Creek's Rex Metzger enjoys the tasks that go along with being the school's track coach.

He will like his job even more this spring, as the veteran mentor is in charge of a bunch of highcharacter athletes in 2018.

"We have a great bunch of kids on both the boys' and the girls' sides," he said.

"They are kids who show up ready to work and get better. This group will get better this year because they are a bunch of hard workers."

With the depth that comes along with having strong participation, Metzger likes the prospects facing the **H-BC boys** this spring.

With 26 kids in grades eight through 12 to build around, Metzger thinks it could be a good year for the Patriots.

"We have more depth on the boys' side this year, and we'll be a young team without a senior on the roster," he said.

"Some of these kids were very competitive for us last year. Now that they are one year older, I think they will be even more competitive."

H-BC is coming off a 2017 season that included a fourth-place finish at the Red Rock Conference meet, a seventh-place showing at the Southwest Sub-Section 3A meet and an 11^{th} -place effort at the Section 3A meet.

Unfortunately for the Patriots, they did lose two key senior members of the 2017 squad.

Zach Scholten, who advanced to state competition in the high jump the last three seasons, was one of H-BC's top point-producers for a number of years.

Scholten placed second in the section and 11th at state in the high jump last year.

Jed Burgers also had a strong senior season at H-BC.

Along with qualifying for the section meet in the 400-meter dash, Burgers ran a leg with H-BC's 400-meter relay, which placed sixth at the section level in 2017.

"Losing those two guys will hurt us, but we do have most of

the guys returning to our relays," Metzger offered.

H-BC's 2018 roster consists of four juniors, two sophomores, nine freshmen and 11 eighthgraders.

The list includes five section competitors and two other letter winners from the 2017 campaign.

Juniors Hunter Bork and Luke LaRock and sophomore Jax Wysong and freshmen Tyson Bork and Gavin Wysong bring section experience to the team. The Wysongs ran with the

The Wysongs ran with the 400-meter relay last spring.

Gavin also will compete in the long jump, while Jax will long jump, triple jump and high jump. Hunter Bork, LaRock and Tyson Bork ran legs for H-BC's section-qualifying 800-meter relay in 2017, while the Wysongs and LaRock advanced to the section meet as members of the 1,600-meter squad.

"We have a lot of the kids who ran relays for us last year coming back, and I think we'll be strong in those events again," Metzger said.

Other returning letter winners from 2017 include junior George Merson and sophomore Easton Harnack.

Merson is a thrower, while Harnack hurdles, springs and competes in the jumps.

Injury kept current junior Garrett Raymon from participating in the program last spring, but Metzger believes he will help the team as a thrower this season. Freshmen Brandon Taubert, Calvin Erickson, Chase Bosch, Jessup Dunn, Tryce Bennett, Dewell Rauk and Zander Wysong could emerge as varsity contributors in 2018.

Erickson and Bosch are throwers, while Wysong is a thrower/ sprinter.

Rauk is projected to compete in the sprints, hurdles and the triple jump.

Dunn runs middle distances and sprints. Taubert runs middle distances and distances and competes in the high jump.


Bennett competes in the high jump and the hurdles. Metzger is unsure which events

Patriot golfers could rise to success this spring

With experience on its side, things are looking up for the Hills-Beaver Creek boys' golf team in 2018.

H-BC is not exactly a veteran team, but with five players returning to the fold with postseason experience from 2017, the Patriots have a chance to become a competitive squad this spring.

"Even though we only have two seniors on the roster. we do have a lot of experience," offered H-BC coach Dan Ellingson.

"It's kind of nice to be an experienced team and a young team at the same time."

The Patriots are coming off a 15-32 2017 season that was deemed a rebuilding season entering the campaign.

H-BC placed sixth at the annual Red Rock Conference meet and was unable to reach the second day of play as a team at the Section 3A Tournament last spring.

Considering the team's lone seniorin 2017, Justin Dunn, didn't see much varsity action, most of the key contributors from last season are back in the ranks.

'We have five of the six kids who played in the section tournament coming back," Ellingson said.

The five returning players are spread from grades nine through 12, giving Ellingson a battledtested team that relies on the performances of upper classmen and lower classmen alike.


H-BC takes an 11-player roster consisting of two seniors, one junior, one sophomore, one freshman and six eighth-graders into the 2018 campaign.

The list includes senior Preston Maassen, who is coming off a solid junior season.

Maassen made the All-RRC squad and advanced to the second day of section play individually last year.

"He is our leader," Ellingson said.

"Preston is a strong kid who hits the ball a long way, and he actually is a pretty good putter. He made the all-conference team and was two strokes away from qualifying for the state tournament last year, and his goal is to get to the state tournament this year."

Dylon Taubert, another H-BC senior, is expected to be another key contributor this spring.

Taubert missed making the all-conference team as a junior by three strokes when he was the team's No. 2 player in 2017.

Other players returning to the squad as varsity players from last season include junior Noah Hellerud, sophomore Parker Gehrke and freshman Thomas Dysthe.

Dysthe, the youngest player on the roster with varsity experience, usually was H-BC's No. 3 player in 2017.

Hellerud and Gehrke were varsity fixtures in 2017 and are projected to be again this spring.

Ellingson will be searching for a sixth player to field a complete team in 2018.

Six eighth-graders are the candidates.

Dallas Page, Jacob Axness, Ethan Kruger and Austin Allen participated in the program as seventh-graders.

They are the leading prospects to move into the sixth spot in the varsity lineup.

Robbie Drake and Brayden Mirth are eighth-graders participating in the program for the first time.

Ellingson lists Westbrook-Walnut Grove as the team to beat in the RRC and Section 3A this year. Murray County Central and

Fulda-Heron Lake-Okabena are potential RRC contenders.

"As far as individual players, I think we have a shot at getting three kids on the all-conference

team this year," Ellingson said.

"I also think we have a good shot at being one of the top three teams at the conference tournament."

Two girls will be playing varsity golf for the second consecutive year for H-BC.

Eighth-grader Tess Van Maanen played well enough to make the All-RRC squad as a seventh-grader.

Hannah Fick competed at the varsity level as well.

"They both played pretty well last year," Ellingson said.

"We thought there might be a couple more girls coming out for golf this years owe could compete as a team, but it didn't happen. Maybe next year."





Luverne baseball team hopes to take next step this spring

After a fantastic finish to the 2017 season, members of the Luverne High School baseball program are hoping to take the next step this spring.

Luverne, a young team that lacked varsity experience in 2017, put together a late-season push that nearly led the Cardinals to their first Section 3AA title in four years.

The dream of advancing to state went unrealized last June, but there's no reason to believe the Cardinals won't make another run for a berth in state competition in 2018 considering last season's rosterremains basically intact.

"We do have a lot of experience," said veteran LHS coach Mike Wenninger.

"Last year we were a young team that took some bumps and bruises during the regular season. We still are going to be a relatively young team this year, but the kids received a lot of varsity playing time last year and gained more experience during our run in the section tournament."

The Cardinals didn't turn in an eye-popping performance during the 2017 regular season.

LHS placed second in the Big South Conference's Small School Division with a 6-4 record, which was a part of a 12-7 regular season showing.

Luverne found its groove during section play, when it won six of eight games to finish the year with an 18-9 record and fall one win short of collecting its first section title since 2013.

The Cards defeated Lakeview (7-3) and Windom (4-2) to open the tournament before taking a 3-1 setback from New London-Spicer in the third round.

The Cards fought back to post consecutive wins over Paynesville (4-0), Minnewaska Area (7-5), Jackson County Central (11-1) and NL-S (3-2) to earn

a berth in the section title tilt.

NL-S, however, topped the Cards 8-3 to claim the championship.

The good news is LHS didn't lose many key contributors from the 2017 team.

Chase Johnson didn't receive many plate appearances during his senior season, but he did play solid defense in right field for the Cards.

Kaden Ericson received some playing time early in the year before an injury sidelined him for the rest of his senior campaign.

With the exception of those two individuals, most of the players who made 2017 a success are back in the ranks.

The Cardinals open the 2018 season with a 20-player roster consisting of five seniors, seven juniors and eight sophomores.

The list includes eight players with starting experience,

eighth-graders Cole Baker, Andrew Harris, Connor Vande Voort, D.J. Swenson, Donovan Leenderts, Liam Raymon, Max Scholten, Oliver Deelstra, Sean Elbers, Troy Durst and Ty Bundesen will compete in at this point.

"I like the relays and the sprinters we have this year, and we should be pretty strong in the field events," Metzger said.

'We do lack depth in the middle distance and distance events. I know we were very competitive with a lot of these kids last year and that we should take a step forward with a lot of the same kids this year."

The Patriot girls may lack the depth compared with the boys this season, but they may be the more experienced team.

"We didn't have any seniors on our roster last year and we have most of the kids who were with us last year coming back," Metzger said.

"We don't have depth, but we should be strong in the field events and I'm hoping we'll field some competitive relays again."

The Patriots turned in a secondplace performance at the RRC meet during the regular season in 2017

H-BC finished sixth in the sub-section field and 11th at the

section meet.

The Patriots open the 2018 season with a 16-athlete roster consisting of two seniors, three juniors, one sophomore, six freshmen, two eighth-graders and two seventh-graders.

The list features six sectionqualifiers, 11 letter winners and one state participant from last spring.

Senior Kourtney Rozeboom gives the Patriots instant credibility heading into the 2018 campaign.

Rozeboom emerged as one of southwest Minnesota's top throwers as a junior, when she advanced to the section meet in the shot put and discus.

Rozeboom finished fifth in the discus at the section event and earned a berth into state competition by placing second in the shot put.

The H-BC standout turned in a fifth-place performance at the state meet.

Along with Rozeboom, junior Sidney Fick, freshmen Taryn Rauk and Ashlee Kelderman and eighth-graders Kenadie Fick and Taylor Durst bring more section experience to the team.

The Ficks and Rauk helped form a 1,600-meter relay that placed third at the section meet last season.

Kelderman, Sidney Fick and Rauk ran with a 400-meter relay that finished sixth at the section event.

Kelderman, Sidney Fick and Rauk also ran with a sectionqualifying 800-meter relay.

Other letter winners from 2017 returning to the team include juniors Madison Spath and Ana Hagen, sophomore Joslyn Birger and freshman Abby Knobloch and Lauren Tatge.

Spath runs sprints and long jumps, while Hagen runs distances and middle distances.

Birger competes in the hurdles and triple jumps, while Knobloch hurdles, throws and competes in the high jump.

Tatgeruns middle distance and distance races.

Senior Avery Wysong didn't participate in the track program last spring, but Metzger believes she can help the team in the sprints and as a thrower.

Freshmen Erika Dysthe and Shayla Rainford are middle distance runners, while seventhgraders Olivia Bork and Tyrae Goodface-Shanahan round out the roster.

"We have a great bunch of girls who are always trying to get better," Metzger concluded.

three all-conference selections and two honorable mention picks from 2017.

The roster is a solid one that contains a number of versatile players.

"Of the 12 juniors and seniors we have on this team, many of them are multiple position players," Wenninger said.

"We'vegotalotofguyswhocan pitch, and we can plug someone into the position vacated by the guy who is pitching at the time without losing much. That really helps us because that's usually not the way it works in high school baseball."

As returning all-conference performers, seniors Tyler Reisdorfer and juniors Derek Lundgren and Ben Serie are proven leaders of the team.

Not only are they some of Luverne's top returning pitchers,

they also are solid defenders who are productive at the plate.

Reisdorfer can play any position on the field when he's not on the mound.

Lundgren and Serie played the third base and shortstop positions when they were not pitching last year.

Along with the returning allleague selections, seniors Jaxon Nelson and Declan Beers are coming off seasons that includedthem drawing honorable mention from the BSC coaches.

Nelson plays first base and pitches.

Beers returns as the starting catcher and pitches as well.

Juniors Gaige Nath, Mark Sterrett and Charlie Reisch bring more starting experience to the 2018 team.

Nath, unfortunately, will not return as a starting outfielder this spring as he will miss the entire season due to an arm injury he sustained this winter.

Sterrett started at second base as a junior and has the potential to play in the outfield.

Reisch returns as the starting center fielder.

Two other juniors expected to help the team in 2018 are Jade Smith and Jake Haugen.

Haugen, who missed the entire 2017 season due to injury, is a strong pitcher who can play infield positions.

Smith is another pitcher/ infielder.

Rounding out the seniors on the roster are Dylon Mente and exchange student Frederik Nielsen.

Both Mente and Nielsen are potential outfielders.

"I like that we have pretty good pitchersonthisteam," Wenninger

said.

"We've also got a lot of guys playing positions with experience. The keys for us this year are to have our pitchers throw strikes consistently, play solid defense and receive timely hitting. We have the experience. We just need the kids to play consistently."

Some of the eight sophomores on the roster could get the chance to play at the varsity level this spring as well.

The list includes Colby Crabtree, Nathan Nekali, Isaiah Bartels, Tyler Roberts, Noah Herman, Quinn Buss, Jacob Von Tersch and Jaden Knips.

Wenninger lists Windom and Pipestone as being the top challengers to claim the BSC Western Division title this year.

As the defending champions, NL-S has to be considered the team to beat in Section 3AA in

2018.

Morris Area and Minnewaska Area are other top challengers for the section championship.

LHS stacks up well with the challengers in both the conference and section title chases, but theCardinalswillnotsneakupon anyone due to their postseason run in 2017.

"I would like to say we have the opportunity to play well with the experience we have, but we won't be surprising any of our opponents because of the run we made in the section tournament last year," Wenninger said.

"We just need to keep on improving, find spots for all of the kids to play in order to keep them sharp. We also want to keep everyone healthy and hopefully make another long postseason run at the end of the season."

Track squads need to scale new True Team obstacle

The Luverne Cardinal track teams face a new obstacle heading into the 2017 season.

After years of running the show as a Section 3A True Team entry, the Cardinals have been bumped up to the Section 3AA ranks in 2018.

LHS still could have something to say about which team advances to state in the new section, but the Cardinals probably will not be the favorites when they compete at the meet in early May.

"We're going to have the same

state meet, but it will be a bigger challenge to get there," said Cardinal coach Pete Janiszeski.

"Class AA has teams with bigger enrollments than we do, and some of them are big enough to have kids specialize in certain events. We're not big enough to do that, so the road to state will be a lot more challenging."

The Luverne girls could be up to the challenge.

The Cardinals are coming off a successful 2017 campaign that included them winning their 11th

goal of getting to the true team consecutive 3A True Team title and falling 1.5 points short of winning the state championship.

LHS also claimed team titles at the Big South Small School Division, the Southwest Sub-Section 3A and Section 3A meets last spring.

TheCardinalsdidlosesomekey seniors on the 2017 roster.

Tianna Doppenberg, who qualified for section competition in the long jump, tops the list.

Doppenberg won the section title in the 100-meter dash along with running legs with Luverne's section-qualifying 400- and 800-meter relays.

The 800-meter squad placed second at the section level to advance to state, where the Cardinals were unable to place.

Bergin Flom, another senior member of the 2017 squad, advanced to state in the pole vault to cap a successful high school career.

Kami Sawtelle placed third in the shot put and discus at the section level for LHS as a senior, while Shelbie Nath advanced to section competition and placed

fourth in the 400-meter dash.

After dominating Section 3A distance runners for years, an injury-plagued senior season kept Madison Schandelmeier from advancing to the section meet in 2017.

A knee injury limited senior Courtney Siebenahler's appearances to one meet last spring after being a top-notch long and triple jumper as a junior.

"We lost a lot of leadership from last year's seniors. Those



kids scored a lot of points for us," Janiszeski said.

Luverne opens the 2018 season with a 59-athlete roster consisting of six seniors, 10 juniors, 10 sophomores, 14 freshmen, six eighth-graders and 13 seventhgraders.

The list includes 30 returning letter winners, 13 section participants and nine state meet entries from 2017.

"With the numbers we have, we will have good depth in all areas," Janiszeski offered.

"We did lose our top thrower from last year, so how much the throwers we have coming back improve this year will determine how we will fare in those events. We also need to develop some depth in the jumping events. On the track, we're going to be as good as anyone. We have a lot of good sprinters, distance and middle distance runners coming back."

As returning state-qualifiers, senior Sierra Schmuck, juniors Jadyn Anderson and Gabrielle Ferrell, sophomore Sydney Biever, freshmen Regan Feit, Autumn Nath and Gracie Zewiske and eighth-graders Tenley Nelson and Brooklynn Ver Steegform the nucleus of the 2018 team.

Ver Steeg, Feit, Nath and Anderson formed Luverne's section champion 1,600-meter relay, while Ver Steeg, Feit, Ferrell and Anderson claimed the section crown in the 3,200-meter relay.

The 3,200-meter relay placed sixth at the state meet, while the 1,600-meter relay finished ninth in state competition.

Anderson also placed second in the 800-meter run at the section level to earn a berth in the state field, where she did not secure a place.

Feit also placed third at the section meet in the 1,600-meter run.

Nath also placed third at the section meet in the 400-meter dash and advanced to the section event in the high jump.

As well running with the 3,200-meter relay, Ferrell placed fifth at the section level in the 800-meter run.

Schmuck, Biever and Zewiske joined forces with Doppenberg to form the state-qualifying 800-meter relay.

Other returning section-qualifiers from the 2017 team include junior Mackenzie Petersen, sophomores Ivy Hudson and Mallory Thorson and freshman Cassie Flanagan.

Petersen advanced to the section meet in the high jump and the 100- and 300-meter hurdles as a sophomore.

Junior Lilli Donohue (thrower)

and Kaylie Ossefoort (pole vault) are new team members.

Other sophomores back on the roster after lettering in 2017 include Gracie Hudson(sprints), Meghan Mollberg (sprints), Alyssa Nattress (sprints), Mallory Oye (sprints) and Madison Gebauer (sprints).





AHS, however, lost games to Wabasso (4-1) and Lac qui Parle Valley (6-4) in the tournament to end the season with a 15-8 mark.


Six senior starters formed the nucleus of the 2017 squad, and the contributions they made to the program over the years will be missed.

Track teams facing numbers crisis in Adrian

A lack of numbers is a concern for Adrian High School track coach Cody Henrichs entering the 2018 season.

One year after AHS had 35 athletes participating in the program, Henrichs will open the new season with a total of 24 athletes on both the girls' and boys' rosters.

With 13 participants, the **Adriangirls** are inslightly better shape entering the season compared with their male counterparts.

Unfortunately for AHS, there were 23 girls competing in the program in 2017.

"We're going to be young on the girls' side. We do not have any juniors or seniors on the roster," Henrichs offered. "We do return a bulk of our section relay team members and a lot of our distance runners this year."

AHS is coming off a 2017 campaign that included an eighthplace finish at the Red Rock Conference meet, a seventhplace showing at the Southwest Sub-Section 3A meet and a 25thplace effort at the section event.

AHS, however, did lose six seniors who were key members of the 2017 squad.

Katia Suarez and Katie Reisdorfer were veteran performers who made an impact at the varsity level for a number of seasons.

level for a number of seasons. Suarez ran the anchor legs for Adrian's section-qualifying 400-

and 800-meter relays.

Reisdorfer was a member of

those same relays before her season was cut short by a broken toe early last May.

Ashley Schnoor was one of Adrian's top throwers during her senior season, while Kahilee Nelson, Kendra Rautenkranz and Consuelo Gil were other senior members.

"Reisdorfer qualified for section competition six times during her career, and Suarez was our anchoron the 400- and 800-meter relays," Henrichs said.

"Nelson wanted to get in shape prior to leaving for the Marines last summer, and I think we did a good job of that for her. Schnoor and Rautenkranz were members of our team for a long time, and Gil wanted to be a part of a team. We'll miss the leadership all of those senior girls gave us last year."

With six sophomore girls, four freshmen and three eighthgraders on the roster, youth will be served at AHS this spring.

The list includes four section qualifiers and one place-earner duringlast season's section meet.

Moriah Bullerman headlines a strong sophomore group of girls, which will be the strength of the AHS team.

Bullerman advanced to the section meet in the 800- and 1,600-meter runs and produced an eighth-place showing at the section event in the 800.

Other athletes returning to the team with section experience include sophomores Kendra Frodermann and Bailey Lonneman and eighth-grader Hannah Henning.

Frodermann, Lonneman and Henning are sprinters who joined Suarez in the 400- and 800-meter relays at the section meet.

Three other sophomores who could help AHS at the varsity level this season include Emily LeBrun, Elizabeth Erwin and Emma Madtson.

LeBrun and Madtson are throwers, while Erwin will compete in the throws as well as run sprints.

Alicya McEliece, Erika Alvarado, Cheyenne John and Samantha Wieneke are the freshmen

Promising golfers ready to take swings for AHS

Look for the Adrian High School golf team to field veteran teams containing some topnotch individual players in 2018.

Dragon coach Rob Williamson reports that 15 boys and 12 girls are participating in the program this spring.

The list includes 10 players who took their swings during section competition last year and two past qualifiers for state competition in recent seasons.

The Adrian boys are in a position to make big strides in their pursuit of success in 2018.

Without a senior on the roster, the Dragons compiled a 13-37 record during a 2017 season that included a fifth-place finish at the Red Rock Conference meet.

AHS didn't qualify for the second day of team play during Section 3A competition last year, but two Dragons earned that individually and one of them advanced to the state tournament.

Five of the six boys who represented AHS in postseason play last season return to the team, but that doesn't mean they all will compete at the varsity level again in 2017.

"We have five of the six guys who played at the section meet coming back this year, but I think we'll need to have some playoffs to decide who will be filling our varsity positions this year," Williamson said.

"I think that's a good thing because the kids will have to earn varsity positions rather than having them given to them. Being challenged like that might make the kids work a little harder and try to improve if they want to play on the varsity team."

Adrian's 15-athlete roster consists of three seniors, one junior, four sophomores, two freshmen, four seventh-graders and one sixth-grader.

Seniors Mitchell Veld and Brady Henning are the leaders of the team.

Veld experienced a sensational junior season that included him advancing to the state tournament individually, where he placed 59th.

Like Veld, Henning reached the second day of Section 3A play individually as well.

"Mitchell and Brady are our most experienced players. They have been playing varsity golf since they were freshmen," Williamson said.

Junior John Christians, sophomore Easton Braun and freshman Landon Runia gained varsity experience as well in 2017.

Christians, Braun and Runia represented AHS at the section meet last spring.

Runia is considered to be a

varsity prospect again, but he could be challenged for varsity playing time along with Braun and Christians.

"I think Landon can take a step forward this year because he plays more golf than any of our kids in the summer," Williamson said.

"He certainly could help the team by stepping up and posting low scores consistently this year."

Other upperclassmen who could make their presence felt at the varsity level in 2018 include senior Nick Harder and juniors Alex Freimuth, Caleb Hornstein and Blake Madison.

Harder played baseball at AHS last year, but Williamson has heard the senior is a decent golfer with varsity potential.

Other members of the program pressing for varsity positions include freshman Jacob Lenz and seventh-graders Brock Henning, Ethan Langseth, Landyn Loosbrock and Logan Nogosek.

Aiden Peterson, a sixth-grader, is another member of the program.

As the defending conference and section champion, Williamson lists Westbrook-Walnut Groveas the team to beat in southwest Minnesota this spring.


Murray County Central and Fulda-Huron Lake-Okabena are other potential contenders.

Adrian Area fields salty team with eight returning starters

Adrian Area softball coach Judy Huisman faces a different situation heading into the 2018 season.

One year after leading a largely inexperienced team into battle, the Dragons will be a salty squad seeking more success this spring.

"This probably is the most experienced team I've had since I've been coach," she said.

Senior Devin Dreesen, a multiyear starter, brings the most experience to the team.

Dreesen pitched and played shortstop for the Dragons last

season, which ended with her securing a position on the All-RRC roster.

Senior Paige Bullerman and junior Autumn Grussing are returning to the program after earning honorable mention status from the RRC coaches last year.

Bullerman is back as the starting catcher.

Grussing is expected to play first base for the second consecutive season.

Other upper classmen who filled starting roles for the 2017 team include senior Madison Neuenberg and juniors Avery Balster and Halle Heitkamp.

Neuenberghasbeen AA's starting center fielder for a couple of seasons. Heitkamp started in right field for the Dragons last year.

Balster is one of the team's top pitchers along with Dreesen, and she can play just about any position in the infield and the outfield when she is not pitching.

Sophomores Kristina Cauwels and Morgan Dreesen round out the returning starters from the 2017 team.

Cauwels is back as the starting third baseman.

Morgan Dreesen is projected to start at second base for the second consecutive campaign.
