Tall Grass Guitar Class brings 'world class' music to Luverne

Musical artists and organizers of Tall Grass Guitar Class will roll out their three-day guitar weekend and benefit concert Oct. 18, 19 and 20 in Luverne.

The event will bring three "world class" guitar players to Luverne for three days of guitar study and a culminating performance at the Palace Theatre.

Featured artists are Pat Donohue, Verlon Thompson and Lee Roy Parnell.

Donohue is a Grammy-winning national fingerpicking guitar champion and bandleader of Prairie Home Companion.

Thompson is 30-year singer, songwriter, guitarist and partner of songwriting icon Guy Clark.

Parnell is a country and blues

artist, singer, songwriter and guitarist with 20 top singles hits.

The three musicians will gather at Take 16 Brewing Company for a private meet and greet "jam session" Friday night with registered guitar students.

After Saturday and Sunday lessons, Tall Grass students will participate in a sound check Sunday afternoon at the Palace Theatre where the

artists will later perform in concert from 7 to 9 p.m.

"I'm still kind of pinching myself," Scott Johnson told a small gathering on June 20 when the event was announced.

He said the three guitar heroes in one place at one time will be a unique opportunity.

"I'm just astonished."

Johnson is CEO of the South-

western Mental Health Center, which is sponsoring the event in honor of its 60 years operation in southwest Minnesota and to increase awareness of rising suicide rates in the region.

"We look at this event as a way to say 'thank you' to Luverne and southwest Minnesota for 60 years of partnership and support," Johnson

Who will care for the children?

Updated study shows widening gap between child care demand and child care options

There were 56 licensed child care providers in Rock County in 2016 compared with and 37 today, creating a rapidly widening gap between working families who need child care and the available slots with licensed providers.

At last count, inventories show a need for more than 180 children over the available licensed spaces, and local leaders are exploring ways to address what they consider to be a child care shortage crisis.

On Monday the Luverne Economic Development Authority reviewed findings from an updated market feasibility study for a child care center.

The first one in 2016 provided useful data to prompt conversations over the past couple of years with government officials, schools, community leaders, non-profits and with local providers who shared insights into the challenging business of child care.

Why not just build a facility?

While there will always be a need for in-home providers, a center would cover the child care shortage, in addition to ongoing local needs like drop-in care, sick care, extended hours and coverage for home-based closures due to illness or vacations.

However, despite a clear demand, business models show a child care center is a challenging venture — for many of the same reasons there are fewer in-home providers.

"It's a challenge to keep rates affordable for families while offering high wages for child care staff," said EDA director Holly Sammons who serves on a local committee working on child care solutions.

According to feasibility studies, centers that pay professional wages to directors and staff have difficulty making it cash flow (even with a donated building), given the low wages of average working families in the community.

That's a big reason there aren't enough in-home child care providers; it's difficult to profit amid strict licensure requirements and low family wages. Meanwhile the work is stressful and the hours are long.

Sammons said the theme throughout the local meetings about child care is that there likely won't be one solution; it may be a number of different solutions with a variety of supporters.

"We may need to look at creative ways to fund child care," Sammons said earlier this year when she suggested a combination of public and private dollars might need to subsidize a child care solution.

'Setting the table'

In order to facilitate a solution, Sammons said the city is doing what

Hills Rez is first park in county to get wired for broadband

The Hills Rez Park is the first campground in Rock County to receive access to broadband Internet.

Campgrounds in the cities of Hardwick and Magnolia, Blue Mound State Park north of Luverne, and the Beaver Creek baseball field and park area are on track to have service this fall or next spring.

The Hills Rez has 10 camping pads and each spot has access to

WiFi services.

The camp connections are a project of the Blandin Broadband Communities Grant to increase broadband Internet use across all sectors, including agriculture, education, health, private businesses and private use.

"Having WiFi at the campgrounds would give campers a way to better engage with the park and their community," said Calla Jarvie, Rock

County Library director.

The Rock County Library received a 2018 Broadband Communities Grant, and a local committee was established late last year to identify gaps in broadband service.

Hills Mayor Keith Elbers is on the committee. "Every gadget nowadays needs WiFi," he said.

At the Hills Rez, the grant will be used to purchase the equipment and one year of WiFi service. The city will

then pick up the service costs. "It's not very much," Elbers said.

The WiFi service will also be available to other groups who use the Rez area. The Beaver Creek Sportsman's Club, for example, could use it for the fishing derby, or the Helping Build Communities Stronger group could use it during the annual Hills Friendship Days activities.

Soybean harvest lurches two days forward, six days backward

Challenging 2019 growing season continues with challenging harvest season as persistent wet weather impedes progress for farmers facing already bleak conditions

The big push started Tuesday, Oct. 8, for the local soybean harvest, with machinery, trucks and wagons kicking up dust in nearly every part of the county.

After only two solid days in the fields, however, Mother Nature brought the gears to a grinding halt with rain Thursday followed by snow Friday and Saturday.

Those two days in the field were enough to offer a glimpse at soybean yields for 2019.

With the late planting and wet growing season, yields were predicted at roughly 20 percent down from average years (Rock County soybeans typically yield 60 to 65 bushels per acre).

So far that's what's coming in to local elevators, according to Dan Boltjes, sales agronomist with CHS Magnolia.

He said he's seeing 45- to 50-bushel averages, with yield monitors swinging widely from 30 to 55 bushels per acre in a single field. A few May-planted soybeans yielded 60 bushels per acre.

Soybeans are coming in with 13- to 14-percent moisture, which Boltjes said is just right. "It's time to get them out," he said last week.

He said the first load or two appeared Monday night, Oct. 7, but by Tuesday afternoon, Oct. 9, harvest was in full swing.

After nearly a third of an inch of moisture, followed by cool temperatures, Boltjes said it will probably be Thursday (Oct. 17) before conditions improve enough to start combining again. "She's pretty greasy out there yet," Boltjes said Tuesday. "And the beans took on moisture."

New general manager starts at event center

SpringBrooke Events will host magician Travis Nye for an all-ages magic show at 7:30 p.m. Friday, Oct. 25, at SpringBrooke Events in Beaver Creek.

The SpringBrooke golf course isn't yet open, but owner Rick Gourley said the event planned for Oct. 25 will be a community celebration for Halloween.

"Who doesn't like a magic show?" Gourley said. "It will be fun, and Halloween is just around the corner."

He described the show as an interactive experience with audience participation and comedy.

Christopher Yungeberg, Brandon, South Dakota, has been hired as the new SpringBrooke general manager. He grew up in Valley Springs, South Dakota, and was previously employed as sales manager at Manley Tire.

Selling tires or planning a shower or wedding — helping people is good customer service," he said. "I enjoy assisting in making it smooth, easy and less stressful."

He said the events center has been remodeled and is available for weddings, receptions, bridal and baby showers or any event with space available for up to 400 people.

Gourley said remodeling is continuing in the basement where next summer a bar and grill will be available for golfers.

An open house for SpringBrooke is being planned in November.

Hills preliminary levy set to increase 1 percent

The city of Hills continues infrastructure improvements under a proposed 1 percent tax levy increase for 2020.

The council approved the levy increase at their Sept. 10 meeting. They also set the required Truth in Taxation hearing for 6 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 10.

The percentage increase over the 2019 levy brings the city tax levy to \$131,856 or less than half of the city's \$337,729 budget for next year.

According to city clerk Connie Wiertzema, the proposed infrastructure improvements include a number of projects:

- seal coating of streets on the city's west side.
- work on Seventh Street.
- extending Rebecca Avenue for one block.
- sealcoating of North

Summit Avenue, waterline replacement.

• additional riprap around the main lagoon or manhole repairs or sewer replacement in block 20 of Helgeson/Qualley Addition.

"There were no increases in city utilities rates (water, sewer, garbage, recycling)," Wiertzema said.

"Rates will remain the same for year 2020."

At the December public hearing, the council will present more details of the city budget and the proposed levy for 2020. The public is allowed to make comments about the proposed levy at the hearing.

Council members are required by state law to adopt a final levy amount by Dec. 30.

The amount of the levy may decrease but cannot increase over the preliminary levy amount.

As a Blandin Broadband Community, Rock County is eligible for a matching grant up to \$75,000 and matching equipment up to \$25,000.

The committee works with Alliance Communications Cooperative in Garretson, South Dakota, which installed fiber-to-the-premise broadband Internet in Rock County in 2016.

"The Blandin Foundation (community grant) helped a ton," said Andy Hulscher with Alliance Communications.

The grant covered costs of outdoor equipment (about \$1,800) and underground fiber optic cable to access points in the campgrounds on 15- to 18-foot poles.

Hulscher said Alliance has worked with only one other facility, the Yogi Bear Campground near Brandon,

to provide broadband Internet to visitors.

"A challenge was receiving the signal inside the metal campers," he said.

Trial and error with various antennae solved the problem of WiFi ability inside campers.

While Jarvie admitted campers are able to access any information they want from the Internet, she hopes they would use the service to look up local restaurants, information about the local area and events in Rock County.

"Campgrounds also have visitors who need to work while staying, and WiFi would allow them to do their work without having to burn their own data or leave the campground in order to find an Internet connection," Jarvie said.

change damage.

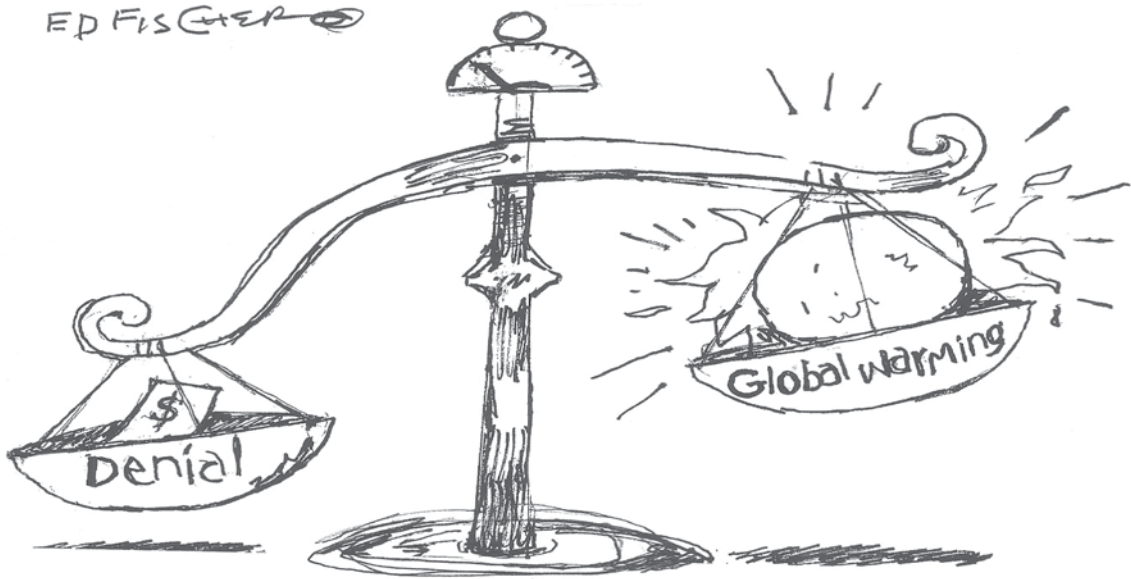

When driving in Minnesota, out-of-state drivers must obey our traffic laws

Question: Minnesota just recently enacted a hands free while driving law, but many states do not have such a law? How is this enforced when people from out of state are traveling on our interstate highways? I have not seen any signs go up stating that Minnesota is hands-free. Would violators just be issued a warning?

Answer: The law will be enforced for all drivers on Minnesota roadways. Minnesotans and all drivers traveling through the state are responsible for knowing the law. It is important to know that the laws in Minnesota may be different than states you may be traveling through. One example is that while Minnesota doesn't have a helmet law for motorcyclists, some states do have mandatory helmet

laws. Minnesotans traveling through these states would be required to follow the law in the state they are riding. Another example is the right to carry firearms. Although you have a permit to carry in your state, another state may not honor your

state's permit.

Hands-free information is available at travel information centers throughout the state and signs will soon be installed at the borders to educate and remind everyone of the law. The hands-free

law is in place to keep all people on Minnesota roads safe no matter what state you live in.

You can avoid a ticket — and a crash — if you simply buckle up, drive at safe speeds, pay attention and always drive sober. Help us drive Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths.

Uithoven Addition lots for sale next spring; mix of single-family and twin home development

The Uithoven Addition has been platted, infrastructure complete and the curb and gutter has been poured.

"It's starting to look like a subdivision," City Administrator John Call observed at the Oct. 8 council meeting.

The dirt has been leveled and is ready for seeding, and now the only thing needed is cooperative weather to pour asphalt.

The new addition has 15 lots for a mix of single-family and multifamily developments, and protective covenants are being drafted and reviewed.

The Luverne Economic Development Authority reviewed the plat drawings Monday morning.

"The premium lots closer to Dodge Street will be more conducive for single-family development," said EDA Director Holly Sammons.

"The southern lots will be slab construction because of the grade, and those will more likely be twin home construction."

She said the mix — likely eight twin homes and seven single-family houses

— will work well together.

"It will give some nice cohesiveness for a really nice neighborhood feel," Sammons said.

The city will put out a request for proposals for developers to construct twin homes on a portion of the lots in the coming months.

Once the protective covenants are finalized, lots will be priced and put on the market, likely available for sale next spring or summer.

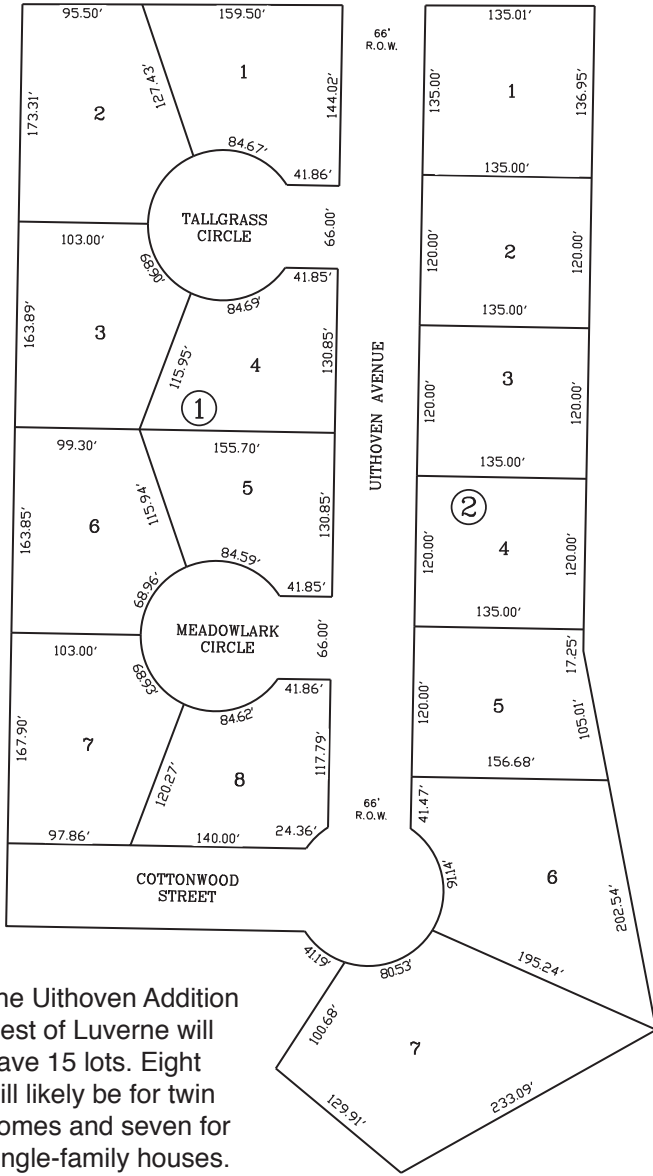
Background

In March of 2018, the city paid \$170,000 for the two acres that formerly housed the Mike and Vi Uithoven residence.

Original plans called for a potential street from the west edge of the development that could connect with Main Street near RCO, but that plan has been abandoned.

Engineers determined that bridges and culverts would be too costly through this wetland area, which is better left untouched.

A retention pond on the southeast corner of the development will hold back storm water before it drains into Poplar Creek.

Think about landscape before pruning perennial flowerbeds, shrubs this fall

Our 2019 garden season is pretty much finished, and now as we contemplate cleaning up perennial flowerbeds and the landscape, we have to decide what to cut and what not to cut. I am not a fan of clear-cutting the perennial garden in the fall. Plants that hold their form add interest to the winter landscape. Additionally, those stems catch snow, which helps insulate the crown of the plant, preventing freeze/thaw cycles that can damage perennials. If some of your plants seemed plagued by fungal diseases — peony and black-eyed Susan foliage with black spots, mildew on phlox, etc. — removing that foliage in the fall helps reduce the likelihood of a repeat infection in 2020. For shrubs in the landscape, do not prune lilacs,

mock orange, weigela, bridal wreath, spirea, forsythia, rhododendron and azaleas. These shrubs have the flower buds for next spring’s display on the tips of each branch, so any fall OR spring pruning removes potential flowers. These shrubs get pruned immediately after they have finished blooming. The new growth that emerges after pruning matures during the summer and the shrub will bloom the next season. For the vegetable garden, be sure you make a map of where you planted what this year so you can rotate your crops next year. That may seem pretty elemental, but I find it is hard to remember next spring. Also, make a note of what variety of vegetable you planted. For example, there are

hundreds of tomato varieties, so if you planted a good one, or if you planted a not-so-good one, you will know what to look for next year. The same goes for cucumbers; some varieties get bitter in the heat of summer and others stay sweet. The work is the same so why not get the best produce for your effort. Back in September I wrote about day length being the reason a poinsettia blooms at Christmas. If you followed my advice about no auxiliary light, your plant should be starting to show some red color developing. Bonnema is a gardening enthusiast and former greenhouse owner. 1929: Congressman Clague visits Luverne, Luncheon Club

The following appeared in The Rock County Star on October 4, 1929.

Frank Clague Is Luverne Visitor

Luverne was favored on Monday of this week with a visit from Congressman Frank Clague, the Representative of the Second District. The Congressman spent most of the day in the city, visiting friends and renewing political contacts. At luncheon, he was the guest of the Luncheon Club and spoke for a few moments on his recent trip in the submarine and his experiences in air traveling. The Congressman told luncheon club guests that he had visited every county in the district and talked with over five hundred farmers in the past few weeks. “There is a spirit of contentment in the district,” Mr. Clague declared, “indicating that conditions are much better than they have been for the past several years. There is quite a movement in land, as a whole. In our county there has been a big land movement and one firm in Redwood Falls has sold twenty farms in the past six weeks. I think I can say that there is a general improvement among the farmers and business men in the district.” Club members especially enjoyed the legislator’s account of a trip in a submarine which Mr. Clague and other House members recently under-took as a part of their investigation, as a House committee of submarine conditions. The Congressman told how he and four other members of his committee went out from Norfolk in the S 5 and went down with it in 135 feet of water, remaining there for two and

one-half hours and enjoying an undersea luncheon during their submergence. Luncheoners enjoyed the description of the submerging and raising apparatus and a general account of sub operations and limitations. Equally entertaining was the versatile law-maker’s account of an air voyage from Lakehurst to New York, in the army’s dirigible, Los Angeles. The Congressman made no comment on the pending tariff legislation, but in private conversation he seemed worried about the fate of farm schedules and inclined to feel that the President should intervene in behalf of farm rates and against industrial rates just as he intervened for the flexible provision.

REMEMBER WHEN

10 years ago (2009)

• There was a lot more than frost on the pumpkins over the weekend and into Monday. With winter weather Friday night into Saturday, and Sunday night into Monday, several inches of snow had accumulated on lawns, trees, shrubs, patio decks and, yes, on the pumpkins. After an unseasonably warm September, area residents wondered if they’d slept right through fall after Friday night’s temperatures plummeted into the mid-20s and stayed there for much of Saturday. This was also the case Sunday evening into Monday morning. The October snowfall didn’t require much shoveling, as much of it melted on streets and sidewalks. But driving on local county roads and I-90 became treacherous overnight as dropping temperatures caused precipitation to freeze on traveled surfaces.

25 years ago (1994)

• Blue Mounds State Park sold 19 buffalo during its annual bison auction Wednesday. According to park officials, sales totaled \$41,700, which is much better than they’ve seen in several years. Bidder turnout was also good this year with buyers attending from Iowa, South Dakota, Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota. Proceeds from the bison auction are returned directly to the park.

50 years ago (1969)

• It’ll cost approximately \$395,442.14 to operate the city of Luverne in 1970. About \$236,019.25 will be raised from local taxes according to figures as submitted at the county auditor’s office Wednesday night. Last year approximately \$219,879.22 was raised from local taxes. About \$16,000 more will have to be levied for 1970. Last November

the citizens of Luverne voted to spend \$2,000 to advertise the city of Luverne. The \$2,000 is included in the \$16,000. Luverne’s city council, after several long budget meetings, adopted the 1970 budget at Tuesday night’s regular city council meeting.
75 years ago (1944) • Ahead of the parade in the post war expansion program slated for Luverne is the Luverne Oil Co., which opens its Firestone Store this Saturday. The store will be located in the front of the Service Auto building, just a half block south of Gimm & Byrne’s. Preparations for the opening of the store have been underway for months and during recent weeks shipments of merchandise have been piling up in the Service Auto building waiting to be unpacked and displayed. Vernon Cornish, who has been in charge of the Luverne Oil company’s preparations, emphasized that this new store was not a “duration” proposition but is being established for “all time.”

100 years ago (1919)

• With \$2,172.00 as the actual returns from a field of potatoes, P. C. Ordung & Son, of Luverne township, find no cause for complaint over the past season’s potato crop. The seed used was Petoskeys and the field yielded 1,400 bushels, which were sold to numerous potato consumers in this city at prices ranging from \$1.50 to \$1.60 a bushel. The task of digging the potatoes and delivering them to the purchasers was completed the latter part of last week. The Messrs, Ordung were aware from the outset that the crop was an extraordinary one, compared with the vast majority of the yields for the present year, but they did not know to a certainty what the field had produced until the delivery records had been checked over.

in the past," he said. "Truly, a remarkable distinction for the Herreid family."

The senior Herreid died in 2017 in Luverne. He served 20 years in the Minnesota National Guard, first joining in Luverne and then later rejoining in Bloomington.

The junior Herreid developed a fondness for Luverne, having lived here as a young child before his family settled

in Bloomington. He later became a regular visitor when his parents retired to Luverne in 1992.

Herreid II enlisted in the Minnesota National Guard in February 1967 and as a full-time soldier rose to the rank of lieutenant colonel of the 34th Infantry Division. He retired in 1993. He and his wife, Jeannine Rivet, make their home in Minnetrista.

In 2017 Herreid II was

named a brevet colonel in a ceremony in Luverne.

Herreid II, through the K.A.H.R. Foundation established with his wife, has sponsored many philanthropic projects to recognize service members, veterans, historians and families throughout the U.S., but Luverne received monetary support for several projects recognized by the Court of Honor.

"He is very selfless, humble, generous and seeks ways to have a positive impact where needs exist," wrote Maj. Gen. Jon Jensen in Herreid's Court of Honor nomination. "A truly remarkable leader and soldier."

Herreid's many contributions to Luverne include:

- annual candlelight vigil the Sunday prior to Memorial Day.
- commissioners room constructed in the Rock County Courthouse.
- remodel of the former Rock County jail and sheriff's residence to a military museum that bears the Herreid name.
- designed and constructed the Veterans Memorial on the Rock County Courthouse lawn including a restored Civil War cannon.
- new readiness center in Luverne, built with state, federal and private funds.

"A most significant philanthropic gesture, never before accomplished in Minnesota, was his major financial commitment (\$5 million) to assist in funding a new Luverne Army National Guard training facility," Jensen wrote. "This is truly a very magnificent gift to the city, county and the Minnesota National Guard."

The new facility will be finished in 2022.

Need a wheel chair? Have a walker to donate?

A.C.E. is the place for medical equipment give and take

Linda Wenzel accepted some much-appreciated help last week from Sanford Luverne therapists during their annual community service work for Physical Therapy Month.

Wenzel is the Aging and Volunteer Services Coordinator for A.C.E. (Advocate Connect Educate) of Southwest Minnesota - Rock County, and one of her duties is to help area residents access medical equipment.

On Tuesday a group of physical therapists from Sanford Luverne showed up to help Wenzel clean, service and organize the fleet of medical equipment that A.C.E. shares with the community.

The large supply of wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, commodes, shower chairs and other medical equipment is stored in City Hall (formerly the Luverne Community Hospital building).

The supply acquires items when donations come in or as loaned-out items are returned and, over time the collection gets scrambled and difficult to access.

That's where the Sanford physical therapists helped out Tuesday.

They inventoried the supply, weeded out duplicates or broken pieces, cleaned and serviced the equipment and organized it in easy-to-access locations.

"They did a phenomenal job," Wenzel said. "It was a mess, and they wiped everything down and made sure everything was in good condition."

According to physical therapist Jennifer Hoefert, the project fulfilled their commitment to giving back to their community during Physical Therapy Month.

"We were looking for a project that would benefit our patients and community to celebrate these events," she said.

Hoefert said it makes sense for her and her colleagues to work on the equipment, since they often refer patients to the A.C.E. "loan closet," and the work helps familiarize them with what's available.

"Our therapists often have patients that are in need of these types of assistive devices and medical equipment," she said.

"The different devices improve safety, increase their ability to be independent in their activities of daily living and help with their mobility."

Hoefert said the equipment is often key for helping a person continue to live at home or perform showering and toileting independently.

Some patients purchase the equipment while others may only need it temporarily after a surgery or during recovery from an illness or injury.

In these cases, borrowing makes more sense than purchasing, and patients who can't afford to purchase or rent can also borrow from the Rock County A.C.E. office.

"The A.C.E. loan closet fills this need in our community," Hoefert said.

Anyone in need of items can borrow equipment for a small deposit, which is reimbursed when the piece is returned.

People can also donate equipment that they are no longer using to the loan closet.

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What’s in a name?

At the Joe Duggan Family Wildlife Management Area dedication on Oct. 2, I was greeted by about 100 people all standing in the rain with big smiles on their faces.

There have been a few land dedications that mean a lot to me and many others were for folks I did not even know.

Joe Duggan worked tirelessly for conservation for over 25 years and was credited for many legacy-type accomplishments over that time frame. Congratulations to Joe and his family.

When you see a public land parcel that has a person’s name on it, there is generally a story behind it.

The first one I was involved with was in 2004 when we named a new Pheasant Run parcel after Dan Doles, a longtime Soil and Water Conservation District employee.

It was the Dan Doles Memorial tract of Fenmont Wildlife Management Area in Nobles County near the Murray County border.

The Fenmont WMA name did not change; we just added the Doles tract to it.

Including the name of a deceased person to an additional tract can be done with prior approval of the long-term land manager, which in this case was the Minnesota DNR.

To actually name a wildlife management area after a person or group is more difficult. The commissioner of the DNR has to sign off on those deals.

This is normally done when the seller of the land makes a measurable donation to the transaction. In the land transactions I have been involved with in the past, it was quite common for the seller to take a little less money than the appraised value in order to ensure that the tract went to a conservation cause. It still happens today but less frequently.

There is a tract near Worthington named the Sweetie Marie Rall memorial tract of Lambert Prairie Wildlife Management Area.

I donated the memorials from my wife’s passing to the acquisition costs of that parcel, and now, when I drive by that spot, which I do on a regular basis, it seems a fitting legacy for her and for me.

There have been many farmers and ranchers who have approached me over

the past 30 years with a wish and desire that their land be forever protected for conservation and wildlife purposes.

In doing so they realize that those transactions can take much longer than to sell it at auction and then be able to close and get paid in as little as 60 days.

I also find it comforting that the children of aging parents, or those have already passed, want to leave a mark on the landscape that they can come back home to and visit over and over.

I meet with some of those adult children and take them for nature walks on what was once their parents’ land that is now protected for wildlife perpetually.

There is something deep inside that soothes the souls of these folks and myself. Even though Pheasants Forever chapters have been protecting wildlife habitat since the inception of the organization back in 1982, there is still less than 2 to 3 percent of land in the 12 counties of southwest Minnesota that are in permanently protected grasslands on average.

The next time you hear someone clamoring that the state of Minnesota and Pheasants Forever are buying up all the land, you can set them straight.

These areas, regardless of whether they’re dedicated in someone’s name, are all important and very special.

They are small jewels on the prairie. In many places these public lands are the only habitat available to keep our wildlife populations alive during severe winters.

Take a ride down to a wildlife management area near you and sit in the parking lot at sunset. If you leave the radio off, you might hear and see some sights and sounds that will soothe your soul as well.

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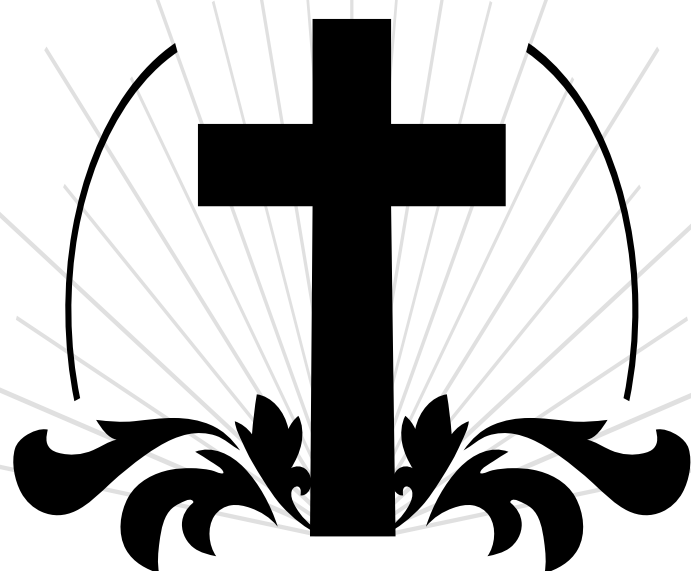

it can to help with the process, but the right entity needs to take charge.

"All we can do is set the table and say, 'Here's what it's going to take,' and make sure all the tools, resources and information is readily available," she said. "This type of data is what lenders and investors need to know."

That's why the LEDA commissioned Maxfield Research, Sioux Falls, to update its 2016

market feasibility study, which was combined with feedback from local employers, providers and schools.

Also, Luverne is partnering with First Children's Finance, a national nonprofit that helps communities and families with available, affordable and quality child care and education.

The agency connected Luverne with the Rural Child-care Innovation Program to

coordinate conversations about the community's unique needs.

Why it matters

The child care shortage affects the entire community, the health and well-being of residents and opportunities for economic growth.

Businesses can't expand here if there's no child care for their workers, and families can't move here to take jobs if there aren't trusted care options.

From an employer's perspective, inadequate or unreliable child care for workers means absenteeism, lost production and difficulty filling positions with qualified workers.

By the numbers

The updated study considered a "primary market area" that included Rock County and surrounding communities, and Sammons reviewed the data Monday.

- Census data shows there are roughly 1,000 children younger than 5 in the market area, and that number is likely to remain steady in coming years.
- Of those 1,000 children, national research shows 42 percent are cared for by a parent or relative.
- The remaining number — 624 children in Rock County — need a day care slot somewhere, and home-based providers are currently the only resource.
- According to national averages, given the choice, 30 percent of families chose in-home care and the rest chose center-based care.
- Based on those trends, if Rock County families had a choice, 187 kids would go to in-home providers and 437 could be enrolled in center-based care.
- Considering it's realistic to capture 75 percent of actual market demand, the more realistic numbers would be

141 for home-based care and 328 could potentially be in center-based care.

"That to me, shows the demand for some type of center-based care in our area," Sammons said.

She cautioned that applying national trends to local data doesn't produce absolute totals.

For example, even though national trends show 42 percent of working families lean on relatives, that number may be closer to 75 percent here. Or, it may be only 20 percent.

"It's gray," Sammons said about the research. "It's a function of assumptions."

- Another way to run the numbers is that Rock County has 37 licensed in-home providers for 12 children each, meaning they can take up to 444 children.
- If 624 children under 5 who need care fill all of the 444 available slots at in-home providers, that leaves 180 children without child care.
- However, each provider can accept only two infants, and some opt not to accept any or to accept only one. Sammons said infant and toddler care are in greatest demand.

All data aside, she said the child care issue is a pressing concern across all social and economic sectors.

"Parents are saying, 'we can't find day care,' and employers are saying, 'we need more day care,'" Sammons said.

Center-based care is clearly needed, but for how many children and for which age groups? That's what the research attempts to determine.

The updated study confirmed the findings of the original study, but this one is more specific, taking into account state requirements for child care centers.

- Considering state requirements, a facility needs roughly 100 square feet per child, counting common spaces like kitchens, bathrooms and hallways, etc.
- Outdoor activity areas must provide at least 75 square

feet per child, with additional space for parking and convenient pick-up and drop-off.

- Base construction costs are estimated at \$130 per square foot for an average wood-framed single-story structure with average finishing. That doesn't account for financing, land acquisition or other "soft" costs.
- If the center were to develop an on-site outdoor activity area, additional costs would be incurred, which can be estimated at approximately \$1,000 per child.

'We need a project champion' for center

The local committee working on child care solutions toured and interviewed a variety of day care facilities in the area to see what works for them.

They connected with Rock Rapids Kids Club, New York Mills, Little Diggers Day-care in Lynd, Benson School District and Victory Christian Church in Balaton.

Sammons said Monday that behind every successful child care center there's a passionate leader or team committed to making sure it succeeds.

"We need a local project champion to bring it forward with enthusiasm and support," she said.

While several parties have come forward with interest in starting a center in Luverne, Sammons said they haven't been able to find the right solution.

A non-profit, faith-based organization is currently considering the venture as a local mission, which would reflect a shift in the approach to local child care.

The LEDA spent \$7,000 on the 2016 Maxfield Research study and \$5,000 this year for updated findings.

Mayor Pat Baustian said it was a good investment.

"I'm glad the EDA went through with the study, because any business looking to build a day care center is going to need this data," he said.

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
