Blizzard cripples region

Schools across the tri-state region closed classes for the day Tuesday, Feb. 2, ahead of the heavily forecast blizzard that started in Nebraska and Iowa and moved northward through southern Minnesota.

Five to 8 inches of snow were predicted for Rock County and southwest Minnesota, and as the Star Herald went to press Tuesday, snow had begun to fall.

Icy flakes sliced sideways through the air as gusty winds nearing 40 mph swept snow across roadways, limiting visibility.

Lt. Matt Sorenson of the Minnesota State Patrol said various state agencies had begun to discuss the possibility of closing major arteries through District 7, which encompasses more than a dozen counties in southwest

"They take into consideration a multitude of factors, including commerce," Sorenson

"Milk trucks and grocery trucks and newspaper delivery trucks are all affected when roads close, so these things are taken into consideration, as well as the safety of the motoring public."

The District 7 engineer is ultimately responsible for road closures, which in this district would mean I-90, Highway 75 and Highway 23.

Physical barriers prevent traffic from entering the interstate, and flashing lights in Luverne and Pipestone warn motorists that roadways are

Sorenson said it's rare that the state closes highways for blowing snow, but once drifts start building up to the point where plows can't stay ahead of them, that's when closures are considered.

"And it's not that we decide to close the roads and then close them; it's a process whereby we

H-BC students create large self-portraits

Hills-Beaver Creek seventh-graders in Mary Petersen's art class are learning how to enlarge an image of themselves using a grid.

This method of enlarging has been used by artists for centuries.

Petersen shared the following information:

"To make the project more fun, the students could make a funny face if desired when I snapped the shutter.

"The students were given the black and white 4-by-6-inch photos. Next came using rulers and yardsticks to grid the photo with one-inch squares. The final copy paper was gridded with 3-inch squares to enlarge the 4-by-6-inch photo to fit the 12-by-18-inch paper.

"After completing the grid on both the photo

and drawing paper comes drawing what you see in each individual square in the photo with the corresponding square on the 12-by-18-inch paper. It becomes evident right away if a student isn't concentrating while using the grid. The students were reminded to look at where shapes start and end in each square to get things right.

"Once all of the necessary lines are drawn out, students paint the portrait. They choose either blue or red as their main color, plus they can use white and black. A monochromatic (one color) scheme is used to force students to see value changes in their black and white photo.

"All in all, most students have success with getting a good resemblance and matching values to the photo."



Jim Brandenburg, Walter Mondale keynote MNA Convention

Governor Dayton backs off on buffer strip requirement

Luverne native Jim Brandenburg was the keynote speaker during the Thursday, Jan. 28, luncheon at the Minnesota Newspaper Association's 149th Annual Convention.

Brandenburg traveled the globe for over three decades as a photographer with National Geographic Magazine and he has done assignment work and has been published in numerous national and international publications.

In his address to Jim Br newspaper people in the audience, he referred often to his roots in Rock County and shared dozens of images from the Blue Mounds State Park and Touch the Sky Prairie northwest of Luverne.

Brandenburg spoke about his passion to preserve native prairies and stop the open hunts on wolves — both, he said, are misunderstood and misrepresented elements of nature. Through his photographs, he said he hoped to

educate the world. "I've often wondered, do my photographs make a difference?" he said Thursday. "It really makes me smile to think I may have made a difference."

He also spoke about his

Nature365 project and offered a glimpse of current projects in the works about to be released.

Brandenburg's work can be seen on his web page www. jimbrandenburg. com, by visiting the Brandenburg Gallery located in Ely, Minnesota, or the

non-profit gallery in Luverne, Minnesota, benefiting the Brandenburg Prairie Foundation: www.brandenburgprairiefoundation.org.

The luncheon keynote speaker on Friday was former Vice President Walter Mondale

"What a great institution this is," he said to the audience of newspaper people. "... editors, publishers advertising sales people, other elements that make Minnesota newspapers work."
Mondale's record of public service includes Vice President of the United States, U.S. Ambassador to Japan, U.S. Senator, and Attorney General for the State of Min-

nesota. He was also the Democratic Party's nominee for president in 1984.

"I want to talk to you today about two or three problems that bother me as an observer," he said, later in his speech addressing "harsh, rigid, unbending

rhetoric and seeming paralysis of public life" and also environmental crises.

He talked about the news media's role in shaping discussion about issues.

"One of the encouraging parts about any serious predicaments we encounter in Minnesota, we have these editors, reporters and newspapers out there ... speaking up for good sense in America," he told the audience of Minnesota

newspaper people.

"All the more reason we should celebrate the role that you're playing across Minnesota. ... You are there reporting the important news in your communities, and for that I

salute you."

Friday's luncheon was also attended by Gov. Mark Dayton, Lieutenant Gov. Tina Smith, Minnesota Auditor Rebecca Otto, Minnesota Attorney General Lori Swanson and Secretary of State Steve Simon.

Gov. Dayton

briefly addressed the crowd prior to Mondale's speech, telling journalists he would continue to support public notices being published in newspapers — as opposed to allowing public bodies to post them on websites only.

He also used his opportunity at a captive audience of newspaper people to express his disappointment at the recent turn of events for his buffer strip legislation.

"People need to hear from

people like me through people like you that water is no longer abundantly safe and available," Dayton said, singling out streams and rivers in south and southwest Minnesota in particular.

A contentious aspect of his plan requires vegetative buffer strips to protect water from agricultural runoff and erosion. Responding to pushback from farm interest groups, Dayton announced last week that he would no longer press to have privately owned ditches affected by the plan.

But Dayton expressed his dismay at Friday's MNA luncheon.

"It is private effluent that affects public water," he said. "I'm just astonished that there's this fierce opposition to protecting water. ... Because it's private ground, we should allow dumping of whatever they want into public water supplies."

He again urged Minnesota newspapers to keep the issue of protecting water in their headlines.

This week I have some special treats to make for Valentine's Day. The recipe for Caramel Stuffed Krispie Treats was shared by my friend Diana Buffington.

Caramel Stuffed Krispie Treats

Caramel filling:

14-ounce package caramel bits 1 can (14 ounces) sweetened condensed milk

1/2 cup butter Krispie layer:

12 tablespoons butter, divided

in half 10 cups Rice Krispie cereal,

divided in half 10 cups mini marshmallows, $divided; 4\,cups, 4\,cups\, and 2\,cups$ Grease a 9x13-inch pan and set aside.

In a large microwave safe bowl combine caramel bits, sweetened condensed milk and 1/2 cup butter. Microwave on high in 1-minute increments, stirring after each, until caramels are melted, approximately 3-4 minutes.

Stir until smooth and set aside.

Take 6 tablespoons butter and 4 cups marshmallows. Heat in microwave for 1 minute, stir, and repeat if necessary in 20-second increments until marshmallows are melted. Stir until butter and marshmallows are combined.

Pour 5 cups Krispie Rice Cereal into marshmallow mixture; stir until coated. Press into the bottom of prepared

Pour caramel over Krispie layer and then sprinkle 2 cups mini marshmallows on top of that.

Refrigerate for 20 minutes until caramel has set.

When caramel has set, repeat the krispie layer with remaining ingredients. Press final kripsie layer on top of caramel.

Spray a piece of parchment or wax paper lightly with cooking spray and press the krispies lightly and evenly into pan.

Let krispies set up for at least 2 hours before cutting into squares. The caramel layer takes a bit of time to set up. Makes 24 bars.

Marshmallow Hats

1 package chocolate bits or chocolate chips

1 small package shredded coconut

30 large marshmallows Melt chocolate in microwave. Add shredded coconut. Put marshmallows in dish. Dip whole marshmallows in chocolate then coat with coconut. Put on wax paper. When all marshmallows are done, refrigerate just to set chocolate, about 10 minutes.



put out the announcement that it will be happening, and give people a chance to get where they're going," he said.

"We alert towns along the closed roads so they can prepare for motorists who will need places to stay."

At the Rock County Highway Department, county plows continue to clear roads until visibility is too limited. "If they can't see, they don't risk their lives and others on the road," said Eric Woodley, engineering technician at the highway department.

"If they can see at all, they try to at least get out late afternoon to clear roads for end of the day commuters."
