Rasmussen has been H-BC vocal/music teacher for the past three years. Her resignation is effective at the end of the 2015-16 school year.

"I am personally sad at the loss of Mrs. Rasmussen," said School Board member Amie Fick. "She has helped build confidence in the students participating and has impacted them in a positive way."

Due to increased enrollment the board:

•approved adding part-time positions in the seventh- and eighth-grade English, mathematics, social studies and science.

 approved adding hours for physical education, health, and DAPE teacher Darin DeBoer.

approved teaching overload for Jeanette Vanden Hoek for the 2016-17 school year per the master agreement at a cost of \$2,250.

•approved hiring a temporary paraprofessional position at the elementary school.

## In action items the board:

 accepted an anonymous donation of \$200 for elementary

•approved an agreement with the Tri State Buffalos to use the varsity football field on dates requested.

•approved an agreement with ABC-Automatic Building Controls to install digital dialers at the elementary school and digital dialers and a fire control panel at the Hugo Goehle Gymnasium/Locker Room and alarm monitoring at both sites.

# Henrietta De Jongh

Henrietta "Etta" De Jongh, 87, Hills, died Saturday, April 9, 2016, at the Tuff Memorial Home in Hills

Henrietta "Etta" DeJongh was born Sept.18, 1928, to

Robert Maurice Kirsch was born October 14, 1924, to Adolph and Amanda (Hagen) Kirsch at their home in Hills, Minnesota. He was raised and educated in Hills, graduating from Hills High School in 1942.

In February 1943 he enlisted in the U.S. Army. He went throughbasic training at Camp Wallace, Texas, and radio school in Kansas City, Missouri. After being stationed stateside in Texas and Oklahoma, he was deployed to Manila, Philippines, near the end of World War II. His duties included guarding a motor pool and when his unit was deactivated he was sent south of Manila to guard Japanese prisoners of war. He was honorably discharged in March 1946 and returned to Hills. Following his discharge he worked for the Great Northern Railroad

and Minneapolis Gas Company. His life's work as an electrician began at McClure Electric in Luverne and he worked as a

journeyman electrician and plumber for Nuffer Hardware in Hills from 1948 to 1968. From 1968 until his retirement in 1986, Bob worked for Interstate Power Company in Hills and Heron Lake as a lineman and

service rep. Upon retirement Bob and Twila moved to Sioux Falls and then back to Hills in 1991.

Robert married Betty Jane Block on February 8, 1948. To this union five children were born. Betty died in 1959 at the early age of 30. For the next 8 years Bob raised his five children with the help of the Block family, the Hagen family and the village of Hills. On June 17, 1967, Bob married Twila (Kraetsch) Jauert and adopted her two daughters. Bob always felt blessed to have found the love of his life, Twila.

Bob was a lifelong member of Bethlehem Lutheran Church, having served on the church council and cemetery board. He was a member of the American Legion Post 399 for 71 years. As an active member of the Hills community, Bobhad served with the Hills Fire Department, the Hills City Council and as mayor of Hills for a short time. He was always proud of his Norwegian

heritage and every May 17th he would observe Syttende Mai (Norwegian Constitution Day) by proudly flying his Norwegian Flag.

Bob took up golf in his retirement and enjoyed that activity with his wife and friends for many years. During the winter months, Bob and Twila enjoyed the warmer weather of southern Texas for a number of years. They enjoyed traveling to many parts of the US and Mexico visiting family, their children, grandchildren and friends.



**75 years ago (1941)**•The \$40,000 public school building at Inwood, Ia. was completely destroyed by fire Sunday, the origin of which is still a mystery. Some believe the blaze was started from defective wiring, others say it was caused from lightning, and still others contend that an explosion of chemicals in the school's laboratory could have been responsible. The fire was discovered shortly after the noon hour and help was called from neighboring towns to help fight the blaze. Over 65,000 gallons of water were pumped on the fire to no avail, and by 4:00 o'clock that afternoon the roof caved in and the west wall was down. \$64,200.00 in insurance was carried by the school district.

## 100 years ago (1916)

I haven't kept track, but it's in the hundreds and I am honored every time someone takes the time and makes the effort to contact me. I always grant permission for such use, and it warms my heart to think that part of my soul has reached out and gently touched the mourning souls of others.

A while back, a company from St. Paul contacted me about printing and framing my poem for wholesale to art and gift shops. We struck a royalty agreement, I approved the proof and <SHAZAM again!> this tiny part of my very soul is for sale on Amazon, Wayfair and even Walmart websites

and is even on the wall of Crossroads in Sioux Falls.

I am a writer. It's what I do. Always have. Probably always will. Something in my heart and soul overflows and needs to be poured out in written form, or I may very well explode and that would not be pretty. I've written a ton of drivel, some comedy, a few informational pieces, a bit of drama, a tragedy or two and lots of miscellaneous stuff. Every writing, good and bad, is a part of me.

Now I don't know how real artists feel about their art, but I am possessive of my writings. I did have the honor of corresponding with Ron Tramner, author of the very famous "Broken Chain" poem and I know he feels the same. I like to see these minute bits of me

in print. I love having people read them and I certainly don't mind making a dollar or two because of them.

Mr. Tramner suggested I Google my poem once in awhile to see if anyone is using it inappropriately. This week I came across a gal who owns a flower and gift shop in Iowa that is selling my "Close the Gate" poem on handmade signs and in vinyl lettering on tiles. This is not an ignorant teenager used to pirating movies and images off the web; this is a grown businesswoman who knows better.

If you want to hand letter my poem on your living room wall or copy it down and carry it around in your wallet or use it to honor a farmer who's passed on to Glory, then fine. I'm delighted. But use a piece of my soul to try to make money without my permission and... well... you don't want to poke that bear.

It's called copyright infringement and it's against the law. Such disputes are usually resolved through direct negotiation, a notice and takedown process, litigation in civil court or prosecution by the criminal justice system because it's stealing.

People who do this sort of thing have serious ethical problems. They don't respect the artist, are just out for the almighty buck and not willing to share it in the form of royalties.

Shame on you, Sarah. You've made this bear roar, Cease and desist and shut the front door!

trimmed and cut into 2-inch pieces.



In a wok or large skillet, stir-fry the beef, onion, salt and pepper in oil for 3 to 5 minutes. Add garlic; cook 1 minute longer. Remove and keep warm.

In the same pan, stir-fry asparagus and mushrooms in butter until asparagus is tender. Return beef mixture to the pan. Stir in soy sauce and lemon juice; heat through. Serve with rice.

Yield: 4 servings.

#### **Crunchy Asparagus Medley**

- 1 1/2 pounds, fresh asparagus, cut into 2-inch pieces
- 1 cup thinly sliced celery
- 2 cans (8 ounces, each) sliced water chestnuts, drained
- 1/4 cup slivered almonds, toasted
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons butter

In a large saucepan, cook the asparagus and celery in a 1/2 inch of water for 3 to 5 minutes or until crisp-tender; drain.

Stir in the water chestnuts, almonds, soy sauce and butter; heat through.

Yield: 8 to 10 servings
