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4-H families preparing for showtime

For many kids, summer is about relaxing and letting time float by. But this is not the case for those involved in 4-H.

For 4-H kids, ranging in age from kindergarten to 19, summer is a busy time of year.

The Rock County Fair is set for July 29 through Aug. 1, so now is the time they're putting the final touches on their fair projects, starting planning for fair competitions and their schedules start filling up with pre-fair activities.

The Lee and Casey Westphal family includes 4-H members Joanna and McKenna. The girls will both be bringing five projects to the fair.

The girls will spend every day at the fair from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. to care for their horses. This year they will be bringing four horses. They will be responsible for feeding and watering the horses and cleaning their stalls.

The 4-H members work together and help each other with the work.

Members of 4-H work in the food stand with one of their parents, and older 4-H members work in the pop stop which sells pop and pizza.

The Westphal girls have traveled to the Minnesota State Fair every year since they were in the 7th grade.

The Blue Ribbon 4- H Club meets every month, except in July when members are busy preparing for the fair, in the Hills American Legion. Their leader is Cheryl Hartman.

Joanna is also involved in the Horseless Kid Program, which is held every Wednes-

day in the summer months at 5 p.m. at the fairgrounds in Luverne. This program gives kids who don't have horses a chance to become involved with horses.

Joanna said, "Every kid should be in 4-H." McKenna feels 4-H has shaped them into the girls they are today.

The fair projects of the Westhpal girls, along with dozens of other 4-H members, will be on display at the Rock County Fair July 29 through Aug. 1. Judging starts on Wednesday.



Fair Board ready for 2015 event

The 2015 Rock County Fair is set to begin next week with 4-H judging starting on Monday, July 27, and shows opening Wednesday, July 30.

Events and activities are set to continue through Saturday night, and Fair Board Secretary Lee Sells said this year's event is shaping up to be a crowd pleaser.

For one thing, he said there's an extra grandstand event, the Rock County Speedway Races, which will bring back the same mix of mini sprints and stock cars that were popular at the June 4 event at the fairgrounds.

In what's been dubbed the "Salute to Agriculture Night" in the grandstands, the races feature micro sprinters, hobby stock, a pure stock class and supercharger/front-wheel drive category.

Hot laps start at 7 p.m. for the evening that's sponsored by dozens of local businesses and organizations.

The added grandstand event meant that the annual Rock County Talent Show, which is the usual Thursday grandstand attraction, will be moved to the historic Palace Theatre on Main Street.

"That was always the backup location," Sells said about the venue change. So, he said, it won't be a difficult switch for fans and contestants to go to the

Hills City Council approves \$29,450 water tower project

Hills City Council members approved repairs to the inside of the water tower at their regular meeting held July 14.

Maguire Iron Inc., Sioux Falls, cleaned and inspected the water storage tank on May 12 and found the following repairs are needed on the inside:

•The complete interior of the city's water tower needs

to be sandblasted, which will include the hatches, roof and all railings.

•A complete prime coat of Tnemec Epoxy should be applied to all blasted surfaces following the manufacturers specifications.

•After that, a full finish coat will be applied to all surfaces in a different color to ensure complete coverage as per manufacture specifications.

•After painting and curing is complete, the interior wet surfaces will be disinfected.

Total cost of the repairs is

A motion to approve the project was made by Alan Leenderts and seconded by Brad Berkhof.

Next year repairs on the exterior of the water tower will be completed.

In other business the City Council approved the follow-

ing building permit requests: •Tyler and Marissa Leuthold for a fence

•Stan Metzger to replace shingles on the house and garage and replace siding on the garage to match the house.

•Todd Holthaus to replace shingles with new asphalt shingles.

The council also:

•approved an LP contract proposal for 4,000 gallons of propane from Popkes Inc., Rock Rapids, Iowa.

•discussed street repair on South Central Avenue which was damaged in the ice storm in 2013.

Repairs will be covered by FEMA, which approved a time extension for all work to be completed and all expenses incurred by Nov. 30, 2015.



Hills-Beaver Creek School Board members received training on their new laptop computers at their board meeting on July 13

The laptops will have the capability to sync with material on an overhead projector for presentations and board members will have access online to all board documents via Google Drive.

The board will no longer be using paper, saving money in print and paper costs, in addition to staff time.

In other district business:

•The board hired Amanda Rozeboom for the Secondary Paraprofessional position at the high school.

•The board accepted a \$100 donation from Luverne Street Music to be used for the H-BC Band program.

•The board approved the superintendent to enter the school district in a bus lease purchase agreement for a 77 passenger 2016 bus for five years not to exceed a cost of \$90,350. The district will have ownership of the bus at the end of the lease.

Palace stage, which he said is well suited for talent competition.

Another major grandstand event at the fair will be the return of the Arch Allies tribute band, which will play songs by Journey, REO Speedwagon and Styx.

"They drew quite a crowd last year," Sells said about the 600plus crowd for Arch Allies at last year's fair. "Hopefully this year it goes just as well if not better."

The concert, sponsored by the Luverne Area Community Foundation and the Rock County Ag Society, begins at 8:30 p.m. on Friday, July 31.

Sells said the Enduro Race, sponsored by Connell Car Care, will again be the main event at the grandstands Saturday, Aug. 1.

"Our enduro always has a huge following," he said about the event, which typically draws about 800 people.

Sells said there are typically 20 to 30 early signups, with another 15 to 20 that show up at

the gate

The event starts at 7 p.m. Sells said there are several attractions to watch for at the fair this year, in addition to the usual 4-H and open class displays.

Demonstrations by a chainsaw woodcarver and by an oldtime blacksmith will go on from 3 p.m. to close Thursday through Friday at the fairgrounds. Also, there will be a live pottery wheel demonstration near the Floral Hall.

The kids Pedal Pull will be at 2 p.m. Saturday at the grandstands and the beer garden will be open nightly Thursday through Saturday.

Midwest Rides and Concessions will again provide midway services from 6 p.m. to close Thursday and from 3 p.m. to close Friday and Saturday.

Advanced ride tickets are available at local businesses and at the Chamber office from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. this week.

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

I just spent the weekend at a small town gathering with some dear friends. There were burgers and hot dogs on the grill, a potluck, an amazing (choreographed to music!) fireworks display, a campfire and the usual family drama that happens when an extended family gets together.

The mother of the children who throw the party (now in their late 40s and 50s) was recently diagnosed with Alzheimer's and had a bout with pneumonia, which resulted in a stay in the hospital. After much debate, the kids decided it was in her best interest to move Mom into an assisted living facility.

Shirley, though not physically very big, has always been a go-getter. A farmer's wife, it became known early on in her life that it was her calling to take care of everything and everyone. After they retired from the farm, one by one from her husband, to all of the farm neighbors, to those who

went to her church, she hauled to doctor appointments and made as comfortable as she could until they passed on to Glory.

Now, with no one in dire need of her caring, what is left for her to do? The flower garden is not the same with no one to comment on its loveliness. So the goldfish need her? Perhaps, but they never really bonded with her. The cat couldn't come along to the new apartment and even though Snicky is 15 years old and lived on Shirley's lap in the rocking chair, in the new place she doesn't seem to miss him or even know he is not there. She doesn't recognize her own bedroom set but, thankfully, she still knows the children. It seems this too will go in time. Sadly, most likely sooner than later.

I remember when the movie "The Notebook" came out. For those of you who haven't seen it, please do so as it is a treasure of a story about aging and love and memory

loss that everyone should have the opportunity to experience. Alzheimer's will most likely touch each of our lives eventually, either personally or someone in our near circle. Recent statistics find one in nine Americans over the age of 65 years of age currently suffer with it and one third of those over 85 do. That's a lot!

I think now of my own memories as I flip through old photographs of our children. Years ago I took a class in scrap booking, which seems just as popular today as it did back then. There are entire stores dedicated to selling the wares from the special acid free paper to all the embellishments you can add to the pages.

I bought a bunch of the scrapbooking gear and I tried, really I did, to follow the teacher's instructions but cutting out the "unimportant" clutter of backgrounds in my photos was more than I could bear. Though the class was not graded, I surely would have received an 'F' if it was for

"failure to crop."

Cropping is something I cannot do in my life with my photos or much anything else for that matter. I want to see that tree in the background of that print to remember that we planted it. To recall what size it was in reference to my children at that point in time; to remember its demise in a violent cross wind. To feel the tingle in my spine when I remember how frightened I was with three little children in that storm.

I cannot imagine a photo of my siblings and I at my Grandparents without the background of the long departed candy dish full of pink and white stale peppermints on top of the white plastic doily kept on the long gone shiny coffee table in front of the nylon looped tan sofa that refused to show any signs of wear.

I want to see the old oak staircase with the one spindle replaced with a broomstick because my uncle, as a child, got his head stuck through them. I want to see the old garage with the sideways accordion sliding doors that never slide properly and remember the hours I spent in that now torn down and replaced garage with my father who is now in his 80's.

I know the trend is to be "clutter-free" and I am even attempting to get there myself, with the exception of my photographs. They can live in their boxes and in their albums until I've gone on to Heaven.

What if the background clutter of my photos is the one thing that will someday help me remember the names that go with the smiling faces? Or even what they were smiling about? It is a chance I choose not to take.

I refuse to crop my photos of background clutter from the days of yore.

Someday they may help me close the gate and recall what I opened it for.

- 3 /4 cup (3 ounces) shredded Cheddar Cheese

In 3-quart saucepan combine cauliflower, potatoes and carrots in enough water to cover. Bring to a boil; continue cooking over medium heat 20 minutes. Add peas, continue cooking until vegetables are crisply tender (8 to 10 minutes). Drain; set

aside. Meanwhile, in 2 quart saucepan melt butter.

Stir in flour, salt and pepper. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until smooth and bubbly (1 minute). Stir in milk. Continue cooking, stirring often, until mixture thickens and comes to a boil (8 to 12 minutes). Boil 1 minute. Remove from heat; stir in cheese until melted. Pour over vegetables. Yield: 6 (3/4 cup) servings.

Everyone can take a turn cranking when making

Homemade Ice Cream

- 4 cups milk
- 4 cups whipping cream
- 11/2 cups sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 /8 teaspoon salt

In 3-quart saucepan combine milk and whipping cream. Cook over low heat until war (6 to 8 minutes). In large mixer bowl combine remaining ingredients. Beat at medium speed, scraping bowl often, until smooth (2 to 3 minutes). Gradually stir into milk mixture. Cool to room temperature. Pour into ice cream canister. Freeze in ice cream maker according to manufacturer's directions. Yield: 1 gallon
