Tour de Loop to celebrate trail opening

The community will celebrate the grand opening of the Luverne Loop Trail during a ribbon-cutting and "Tour de Loop" bike ride Thursday, June 1.

"We're going to try to make it an annual event that's on the Thursday before Buffalo Days," Chamber Director Jane Lanphere said.

"It's going to be a familyfriendly community bike ride ... and this year because we're celebrating the completion of this beautiful trail system through our community, we're pulling out all the stops."

The ribbon-cutting will be at 5:30 p.m. at the trailhead building on East Main Street where ride maps and Tour de Loop instructions will be available from 4 to 7 p.m.

Bicyclists will ride the trails from 4 to 7:30 p.m. entering drawings at five individual stops for prizes that will be drawn at 8 p.m. (must be present to win). They need to pick up their number at the trailhead before they ride.

Prizes for youth and adults totaling \$2,500 include Trek bikes, bike accessories, helmets, repair gift certificates and more.

Brain health group hosts community conversation about suicide

About 80 people gathered in the Generations Events Center Friday morning for a community conversation about mental health.

The group included a diverse mix of local leaders in city, county and school government and also mental health professionals from local and regional organizations.

Angela Nolz, mental health counselor at Sanford Luverne Clinic, said the goal of the meeting was to increase understanding of how suicide affects community members and identify ways to prevent it.

"As most of you know, our community has been affected heavily over a number of years with suicides, and our aim is to reduce suicide along with educating those around us," she said.

"I want to thank everyone for being here to have these difficult but important conversations."

An important component of Friday's meeting focused on round table discussions.

"What we'd like to hear from you is your ideas about what's going well in our community and what else we need to adopt to create improvement," Nolz said.

Groups were asked to discuss several questions:

•If someone approached you and shared that they were struggling with their mental health.

State under air quality alert due to wildfire smoke

The entire state of Minnesota was under an air quality alert May 18 due to wildfire smoke originating in Canada.

The alert, issued by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency and the Minnesota Department of Health, was in effect through the morning of May 19.

"Fine particle levels are expected to reach the red air quality index category, a level considered unhealthy for everyone," the alert stated.

"In the red area, everyone should avoid prolonged time outdoors." Rock County was in the "red" zone where the air was hazy and had a distinctive smell of smoke. The compromised air qual-

ity was due to a band of heavy ground smoke from wildfires in northern Alberta and Saskatch-

At Monday night's awards ceremony in the Luverne school performing arts center, Don Klosterbuer announced that Luverne's Dollars for Scholars program was 40 years old.

The program dates back to 1983 when the local chapter was established and two \$500 scholarships were awarded the following spring.

On Monday, 67 scholarships totaling \$523,750 were awarded to Luverne High School seniors.

It marked 2,144 awards over the 40-year period for a total of nearly \$6.3 million.

About the Loop

The Luverne Loop offers 7.4 miles of trail around the outskirts of the city. By linking to the Blue Mounds Trail, the Loop provides users a safe route for recreation and transportation that connects areas of interest throughout Luverne and Rock County.

Trail users can access the Loop by parking at the Trailhead or at other public parking places along the route.

Starting at the trailhead, users can go counterclockwise around the Loop by heading north on the Blue Mounds Trail past Luverne Aquatics & Fitness and turning west on 131st Street. Then, heading south on Hwy 75, users have the option to take the spur to the fishing pier at Veterans Pond or cross Hwy 75 and continue on the Loop.

Along the Loop, users

will pass by the Sanford Healing Garden, Veterans Pond and Fishing Pier, city pocket parks, Child's Remembrance Garden, prairie views northwest of town, Luverne Public Schools athletic fields (Prairie View Complex), Nature Explore Classroom, Poplar Creek, restaurants, shops, and hotels along the I-90 / Hwy 75 commercial corridor, wildlife habitat and native grasslands, Dybedock Pond, the scenic Rock River and Redbird Field.

At the Luverne City Park, Loop users can also get on the Chris Ashby Memorial Trail that is 1.95 miles in length.

Starting on the east side of the Rock River near the Trailhead, the Ashby Trail crosses the Rock River, winds through the Luverne City Park and meanders east out of Luverne along Rock River Road and terminates at Rock County Road 9 near the Luverne Country Club.

I have a good friend and co-worker who's hurting. You'd

never know there's something

wrong or amiss about Lori as she continues to handle editor duties without missing an issue.

Except I see the occasional cracks in her strong facade and the forced smiles of someone who's grieving.

It breaks my heart because I wish I could do more to ease her pain.

When Lori decided to take a little time off this summer to focus her energies into "Carson's Cause," I couldn't be more supportive and even more proud of her decision.

The loss of a 21-year-old son to suicide would have meant crippling grief for many people. Lori's response has been the opposite. She's channeling her grief into advocating for better brain health, and I want to be right there for her.

In the last eight months, she's used her writing talent to educate us about gaps in mental health care, has stepped up into a public speaking role and formed the non-profit "Carson's Cause" with monetary gifts that flowed in after Carson's death in September 2021.

"Carson's Cause" is helping our schools reframe the dialogue around brain health and teaching students that seeing a counselor is no different from going to the dentist.

However, these tears of mine are not forever- and very different from Lori's loss.

I know Adam will still be that cheerleader from afar, as I know Carson is cheering his mother as an angel in heaven. In return, I'll be Lori's cheerleader here on earth, with my thoughts and prayers and with active support.

The June 3 "Buffalo Days Run 4A Cause," is a fundraiser for Carson's Cause to support community brain health. Participants can show their support by walking, riding or running, and their registrations and T-shirt purchases benefit the cause.

Don't forget the veterans who made it home but suffer unseen wounds

Memorial Day is a time to honor the memory of men and women who lost their lives while serving in the U.S. military.

But we must also never forget the veterans who made it home but are struggling with addiction and mental health issues and suicide thoughts.

Early intervention and prevention is critical to help veterans find the treatment they need.

More than 300,000 veterans live in Minnesota, according to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, and 16 percent of them have served since Sept. 11, 2001.

"There are many reasons veterans become addicted to drugs or alcohol, but addiction and mental health issues are treatable," said Michael Leach of addicted.org.

According to the National Survey on Drug Use and Health, over 3.9 million veterans have substance use disorders or mental illness.

Substance abuse significantly increases suicidality among veterans ages 18 and older and remains problematic among veterans ages 18 to 49.

Many veterans struggle with adjusting to civilian life and face financial hardships, difficulty finding employment and accessing benefits.

They're at a higher risk of com-

promised mental and emotional health, often due to untreated trauma, and they tend to lean on alcohol and drugs for coping.

Veterans also experience significant barriers to care with insurance gaps, inadequate funding and limited treatment access in rural locations. Stigma regarding mental health and substance use is still an issue.

Outside of the usual VA-Facility locator offered by the U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs, there are other options to consider.

For example, the VA has extensive resources and support for veterans and their families.

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration provides a treatment facility locator where veterans can find specific options for substance use and mental health treatment.

And helpful phone numbers include the Veterans Crisis Line, 1-800-273-8255, and the Lifeline for Vets, 1-888-777-4443.

Drug and alcohol treatment

facilities are increasingly better equipped to treat veterans by offering specific rehabilitation options and treatment for co-occurring disorders.


Families play a significant role in supporting veterans through difficult times. Speak to them openly and honestly about their substance use, and express concern without casting judgment. Help them find treatment.

Be patient and show compassion for what they are going through. Substance use and mental health disorders are treatable.

It takes communities and families coming together to help veterans who are struggling. Too many battle these issues in silence and never get their needed help.

Early intervention and prevention save lives, and providing quick and easy access to treatment and support is critical for veterans struggling with addiction.

The biggest outdoor day of the year in Minnesota was May 13. The fishing opener, to many, is better than any of the other holidays when you don't have to go to work.

Minnesota sells more fishing licenses than any other state per capita. There will have been long lines at many boat ramps across the state and especially at the most popular walleye lakes in the state. There will be a larger than normal number of folks who will have lost their patience with other users on this day than almost any other.

The reason for this is that there is always going to be a certain percentage of folks who either do not understand or just don't care to abide by some of the most common boat ramp etiquettes.

The following ideas will make sure you are not the cause of your fellow fishers' short tempers. The first is that you should never learn how to back a trailer on opening day at a busy boat ramp. I have spent many a day over the past 35 years just sitting on a lawn chair at a boat ramp to watch the follies. Backing a trailer is really not all that hard when you get the hang of it. Getting the hang of it should be in an empty parking lot done well in advance of the opening day rush.

The key to backing a trailer is simple. Put both hands on the bottom of the steering wheel and turn the wheel in the direction you want the trailer to go. Back up slowly and make slow, small movements of the wheel until you can back that trailer like a professional semi-driver. Be ready before you get in the unload line. This means you remove the boat tie-downs, load you gear from the vehicle, arrange the boat so you can move freely front to aft.

There is great benefit to unplugging the trailer lights before you back in. This is not always necessary but if you have any questionable light issues, the bulbs will most likely not burn out if they get wet with no power supplied. LED boat lights have pretty much solved this problem, but my old boat does not have them. I carry an entire box of replacement bulbs in the boat's glove box to ensure I can replace them when needed.

If you are unloading a boat as a solo operator, you should always move the boat around the dock to the non-ramp side once the boat is off the trailer. (I tie it off with a short rope that is never removed from the nose anchor point in the front.) Doing this allows others to continue to use the ramp while you go park and return. This does not work when there are two ramps, one on each side of the dock, but on many smaller lakes and landings there is one dock and one ramp.

ED ENSCHEPTED

Whatever you do, don't budge in line. Everyone wants on the water as fast as they can, and if you think sneaking into the line and saving a few minutes is OK, then you are one of those folks who either don't care or don't know about boat ramp etiquette. Remember that when entering

more comfortable about discussing mental health and suicide prevention?

•How can we help our grandparents and elderly population to have the discussion about mental health and suicide prevention?

•What did you come here hoping to share today but have not had the opportunity to share?

Nolz organized Friday's conversation with Luverne School guidance counselor Amy Cook, Luverne School social worker Stacy Schepel, Jennifer Stratton of Southwestern Mental Health and Sherri Smith with Minnesota courts and chemical dependency support.

They and other professionals meet monthly as part of Luv1LuvAll Brain Health Group that was approved last fall for a Pathway to Care grant through the Minnesota Health Department.

It's a two-year grant for suicide prevention, and Friday's meeting was part of a community assessment related to the grant.

"We're asking what are the things we're doing well, and what are the things that aren't happening that need to occur?" Nolz said.

"The community engagement piece is really at the heart of this."

She said the group has had training on language

and messaging. "Because how we talk about these things matters," Nolz said. "

The goal is to build a community resource list and make sure there are tools for screening and referral processes.

"I feel like we have a really good team of people working on this and everybody is really passionate about what we're doing."

Nolz encouraged everyone in the room to be part of the solution for preventing suicide, no matter how small their role.

"One of the things I've thought about is when we've hard years and hard situations that have occurred, it's really easy to decide this is

just too big and too hard," she said.

Once Friday's information is reviewed, a broader community conversation may be scheduled at a later date related to mental health and suicide prevention.

Meanwhile, plans are underway for the 2023 Out of the Darkness Luverne Walk to Prevent Suicide on Sept. 16 in Luverne City Park.




Nolz said the Sept. 16 walk promotes health and wellness by encouraging people to get out and walk together for a common cause.

1943: Welzenbach used to work as cigar maker in Iowa

The following article is part of the Diamond Club Member group that began in the January 7, 1943, issue of the Rock County Star Herald. Members of this group consist of persons of age 75 and older.

The following appeared in The Rock County Herald on October 14, 1943.

John Welzenbach, Luverne...was Early Day Cigar Maker

Old time cigar smokers well remember the famous "Brown Beauty" and "Speckled Trout" cigars, but it may be a surprise to many of them to know that a Luverne man, John Welzenbach, once helped make them in a Davenport, Iowa, cigar factory. A carpenter's son, Mr. Welzenbach had little choice but to learn a trade of some kind. As there was an opening in the cigar factory, he served his apprenticeship, and continued in that line of work for 15 years. Then, his health was endangered so he quit and moved to Rock county where he started farming. Mr. Welzenbach was born in Bavaria, Germany, October 18, 1868, the son of Anton and Barbara Welzenbach. At the age of three, he came with them to the United States and grew to young manhood in Davenoort, Iowa. Heattended the public schools, but because he belonged to what he terms the "proletariat," he had to begin earning his own money early in life.

Weeded Onions

One of his first salary jobs as a boy was weeding onions in the big onion fields near Davenport. He was about 12 or 13 years old at the time. Anyone who has done any weed pulling at all can well imagine how difficult a task he had. "We'd work on our hands and knees 10 hours a day for 25 cents a day," Mr. Welzenbach states, "and man, would the backs of our ears be sunburned and blistered!" Later, he was promoted from weed pulling to "topping" the onions. This was a more specialized job, and carried with it a salary increase of 75 cents a day, boosting his total earnings to \$1.00 a day.

One summer, he hired out to a farmer to herd cows, and if he had his way about it, he'd have been a farmer from the start, because he always liked working in the open so ing the cigar making trade, and although he didn't make it his life's work, it did provide him with experience that he perhaps never would have had otherwise.

For instance, in the fall of 1895, when the work was slack, he together with his brother and a friend pooled their resources and bought a cabin boat and travelled down the Mississippi river from Davenport to St. Louis. "We had all the comforts of home," Mr. Welzenbach states, "and as long as we were not pressed for time, we were in no hurry to reach our destination. The current of the river and the wind was all the power we had. All we had to do was to guide the boat to keep it in the center of the channel. Once in a while, we'd use our sweeps (a form of an oar) to go to shore where we would do a little hunting, we'd anchor occasionally if the weather was rough. It took us six weeks to get to St. Louis, and we really had a dandy trip. After we got there, we sold our boat and came back by train, just in time to go back to work again."

Came Here in 1900

When he was advised to get out of the cigar factory to protect his health, he immediately decided to begin farming. Being unable to rent a place in Iowa, he came to Minnesota, where his brother-in-law lived. Here, he found, he was able to buy a farm out of his savings, so he made a deal for the purchase of the southwest quarter of section 14 in Mound township. He moved there in March, 1900, and since then, has been a Rock county resident.



Speaking the truth

Today our culture has an estranged relationship with the truth. Mankind's highest pursuit used to be seeking truth at all costs. Faith, science and philosophy were once kindred spirits chasing this same goal but from different approaches.

In the Middle Ages, theology was considered the queen of the sciences. God's revelation in the Scriptures provided the foundation upon which all other scientific discoveries could be built. It was the sovereign power that ruled over all scholarship.

In the course of time, a great revolt occurred. Humans usurped the authority belonging to God and His word, and made reason, feelings and personal experience their queen. As a result, truth was no longer measured against God's will but against mankind's most sinful desire: to be one's own god. This divorce of theology from science did not begin in our lifetime, but we now live with the consequences.

For instance, many people believe that marriage is no longer just for a man and a woman, as God designed it. Marital divorce is so commonplace that people accept it as an inevitability in half of all marriages. Unborn children, the godly gift that flows from marriage, continue to be aborted at alarming rates, even as states other than our own seek to protect these vulnerable humans.
