Call and airport volunteers, 424 had pancakes this year (up from the 2019 record of 413). There were 58 classic cars and 10 participating planes on display.







Stratton begins duties as school resource officer

When Luverne and Hills-Beaver Creek schools open Tuesday for the 2022-23 school year, a school resource officer will greet students in the hallways.

Rock County deputy Jeff Stratton was hired for the new position that will serve as a liaison between law enforcement and schools.

"I will literally have contact with every kid in the entire county and do whatever I can to help them," Stratton said.

"It is something new, never been done here and gives me an opportunity to build a program from the bottom up."

For the past week, Stratton has addressed school staff in Luverne and H-BC about his duties in the districts, which will sometimes include attending evening sporting events.

His main job, however, is to be the liaison between the Sheriff's Office and the school

districts. Part of his job includes checking Sheriff's Office daily incident logs for incidents involving students.

"The biggest thing is making those connections," he said.

During the school day, Stratton will wear a "soft uniform" — a polo shirt and dress pants. He'll be armed, but will only carry handcuffs and a radio. Stratton will wear his full uniform at events.

What will an SRO do?

Sheriff Evan Verbrugge outlined more of Stratton's duties in the school districts at a liaison meeting between the Luverne School Board and county officials Thursday before the regular school board meeting.

"This is an opportunity for our juveniles to see an officer in the best possible light and, if

New director joins RCO leadership

A new executive director joined the leadership team at Rock County Opportunities, which provides services

and employment for local adults with disabilities. Eric

Sage, who started Aug. 24 in Luverne, brings more than 15 of



experience to the position after working with home and community-based services in the Minneapolis metro area.

Since 2016 he was senior director of True Friends, a nonprofit organization providing respite care at camps for children and adults with disabilities.

Prior to that, he worked with Hammer Residences, another influential Twin Cities provider for people with intellectual disabilities.

"It's very rewarding when you can help individuals and their families with needs," Sage said. "I'm looking forward to meeting our families and filling that need here in Luverne."

Adria Benson and Danielle Landberg have been co-directing RCO since Beth Bartels left in 2020.

"Things have gone great as far as the team leadership approach we started about a year ago," Benson said. "But we have kind of felt there was a piece missing and decided to hire an ED to help the organization continue to grow and flourish."

She said the RCO board and directors wanted to get a feel for what they needed and how the executive director's position would be structured before hiring someone.

"I can say with confidence that we are all proud of the last year and what RCO has been able to do with our team leadership," Benson said.

'We are doing well financially, the individuals we support and their teams are happy with the services provided, and we have a great team of staff here."

At the six-month mark, she said they evaluated progress and determined a point person would be helpful to relieve the team leaders of some responsibilities.

"We each still had our previous jobs to do, and adding these duties didn't allow us to devote the time we needed into certain areas," Benson said.

'We felt that it would be really important for the future and growth of RCO to have someone who could focus their time on things like fundraising, legislative needs, ideas for growth and additional community outreach. ... In order for RCO to be the best it can be, we all felt that we needed to bring someone else in."

She said the RCO board and staff are looking forward to working with Sage.

'We're very excited to have Eric start," Benson said.

"He has a lot of experience and knowledge in this field, and he will be able to continue the good things that our team has accom-

Four new teachers start at H-BC

Hills-Beaver Creek School District will add four new teachers to its staff as the 2022-23 school year opens Sept. 6.

Melanie Kruse will teach special education in H-BC Elementary School after spending the past five years teaching at Lifescape Specialty School in Sioux

"I taught in a self-contained classroom for primarily low behavior needs for the first year and then for primarily medically complex needs for the past three years," Kruse said.

The Toronto, South Dakota, native graduated from Deubrook Area School District in 2014 before attending Northern State University in Aberdeen. She earned a bachelor's degree in elementary and special education along with a recently completed master's degree.

She's married to Josh Kruse, and they recently moved to Luverne. The couple has one daughter. Elizabeth, 18 months.

"I am most looking forward to building bonds with students and community in Hills-Beaver Creek and to helping my students grow in their skills," she said.

Allesia Kolles will teach K-12 music and choir at the H-BC elementary and secondary schools.

Kolles grew up in St. Michael, Minnesota, where she graduated from high school. She attended the University of Wisconsin-Stout and received a master's degree from Hawthorn University.

She worked as a substitute teacher for the past four years.

"This will be my first year teaching," Kolles said.

Outstate driver's exam stations decrease service to once a month

Rock County residents in need of a driver's test will have fewer options beginning today, Sept. 1.

Instead of weekly appointments on Wednesdays, the driver's exam station in Luverne is now open once a month.

For Rock County, both written and behind-thewheel examinations are offered the second Wednesday of the month.

State officials cite on-going staff shortages, which began in the pandemic, for the driver's exam station schedule changes.

In March 2020 all exam stations closed due to the pandemic. Months later only regional hubs were open. Worthington is

the local regional hub.

Legislators directed the state Department of Public Safety to reopen all 93 exam stations by Jan. 31. Rock County's weekly service was reinstated Jan. 26.

"I find it really hard to believe we can't get our arms around that issue," said state Senator Bill Weber, Luverne.

Weber recently talked with John Harrington, the state's commissioner of public safety. Harrington was appointed to the position in 2019.

Other than staff shortages, Harrington hasn't responded specifically to Weber as to why local driver's examination station service hours are again being cut.

BACKED BY A YEAR-ROUND

Weber said legislators cannot re-address the issue as a group until the next session starts in January 2023. Under the new sched-

ule, exams won't be available in Rock County again until Sept. 14.

Appointments for driver's tests can be made only online at drive. mn.gov.

New hours will also be implemented today.

Worthington, the local area's regional hub, will be open for written tests from 8 to 11 a.m. and 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. Mondays and Tuesdays.

Thursdays and Fridays are reserved for road tests by appointment only.

The Wednesday schedule is as follows:

•Windom, first Wednesday of the month. ·Luverne, second

Wednesday of the month. ·Pipestone, third Wednesday of the month.

•Slayton, fourth Wednesday of the month.

DPS hasn't released a specific time schedule for the once-a-month service.

However, in the following days I received several unsolicited tips from my iPhone on ways to improve my life with Siri, as if to remind me she still matters.

Luverne opens school year with continued focus on mental health

Superintendent Craig Oftedahl addressed employees at Luverne Public Schools Monday morning in preparation for the 2022-2023 school year, opening on Sept. 6.

In his annual address to all staff members, Oftedahl encouraged them to make "Cardinal Connections."

To illustrate his message, the names of the 1,200 students

were typed on a sheet of paper and taped to the wall outside the performing arts center.

Each teacher, paraprofessional, custodian, cook, support staff and bus driver was asked to place a small sticker dot on each elementary, middle and high student they personally knew.

Staff were challenged to get to know those students who did not receive a dot by their name.

Oftedahl's message to staff explained it is important that every child needs to be known by someone at school.

As a reminder to be a difference maker, a "Cardinal Connector," the staff received T-shirts that say "Cardinal Connection" on the front and "Connect the Dots" on the back.

Supt. Oftedahl's full speech is reprinted here:

Staff encouraged to be 'Cardinal Connectors'

One of the focus areas over the last couple of years across the country has been mental health.

We know that some students are struggling with mental health issues, as well as some of the adults that we deal with, and maybe some of you have struggles as well.

Last year we implemented Project 11 as one means of helping students.

I want to thank you for your efforts to implement that across our district to provide a form of mental wellness for all our students.

We likely never know the impact of this program, but if it helps one student, that is a victory. Keep up the great work surrounding this curriculum. Your efforts are making a difference.

Each of us — and most people say relationships —are important.

One of the keys is helping all people maintain a healthy selfesteem.

I agree that relationships are vital to our entire organization having success. How do you create relationships? By building a con-

Maybe it's sports or pets or family or 4-H or flowers or schoolrelated items like art, math or music. If you connect in any way with students, they will have a trusted adult in this building. That may be

all they need to foster some success. Better yet, what happens if two connections are made or three

Get to know your students, find out about them. Ask probing questions to see that you can grab onto the probe some more.

Not counting the kindergarten students, as they are just entering the building – and I know our teachers and staff will work hard on those students, we have students that need each of you to step up.

I am asking each of you to identify one or two students and work on making a connection. It may not be easy, but the benefits will be astronomical for the students.

The leaders in the building are going to be tasked with writing down the students in their respective buildings and checking to see what staff have connected with them.

Be a difference maker for our students, especially our students that need a "Cardinal Connection."

Law enforcement investigates grave vandalism

The Pipestone County Sheriff's Office is investigating criminal damage to property at the Ihlen Cemetery after Justin Olsen reported at 6:36 p.m. Monday, Aug. 22, his daughter's headstone had been vandalized.

According to a report released Monday morning, Aug. 29, the headstone had been pushed over to the east, and a black tar substance had been poured all over the base and the stone.

"The substance was crusted on the top but still wet underneath," the Sheriff's Office report stated.

"Tips and leads along with other investigative actions have been followed up with. At the time of this release there are no suspects, and this case remains under investigation."

Jordyn Olsen died of cancer in March of 2014 when she was 7 years old. She would have been 16 in July when her family decorated her gravesite with birthday balloons.

Now that image serves as a "before" photo to compare with the photos of the damage, which may have occurred overnight or early morning on Monday, Aug.

Pipestone County Chief Deputy Mike Hamann said Olsen didn't think it had been damaged the day before when he drove by, but there's not a specific time of vandalism listed in the report.

"The only other thing we can go off of was that the black tar-like substance was still wet underneath the headstone,"

Hamann said. "Everything else outside of what was reported would be an assumption."

The phone number for the Pipestone County Sheriff's Office is 507-825-1100 to speak with someone. Call 507-825-1105 to share an anonymous tip or information.

The family has cleaned up the site and has accepted donations for a reward fund that is now up to \$8,000 for information leading to an arrest and conviction in the case.

"We have been working with the cops and have been working leads," Olsen shared online.

"I just want to say thanks to everyone for calls, texts and messages."

An online fundraiser to rebuild the desecrated headstone attracted donations from 175 people totaling more than \$8,600.

"On behalf of the Olsen

family, thank you all for your tremendous generosity," organizers Isaac and Theresa DeBoer posted after closing the fundraiser Saturday.

"The replacement monument has been ordered with plans to put it up yet this fall, provided there are no delays.'

Jordyn's mother, Jodi (Smook), thanked the community for donations to the reward fund and to rebuild the headstone.

"We are beyond humbled and thankful to all who have joined the effort to help find who destroyed the beautiful headstone that adorned our daughter's grave," she wrote.

"Words simply cannot express our appreciation and gratitude."

The family has indicated that excess donated funds, if any, will go to Sanford Children's Hospital and the Ihlen Cemetery in memory of Jordyn.

Fire marshal investigating fires set in Hardwick home

The Minnesota State Fire Marshal is investigating possible arson at a Hardwick home.

The Rock County Sheriff's Office received a call at 5:15 p.m. Monday to conduct a welfare check at 104 N. Ross Ave. where homeowner Deb Herrick expressed concern that her home may have been entered when she was out

According to Sheriff Evan Verbrugge, Herrick said her neighbor who was watching the residence told her that her front door was open and unlocked.

Herrick then called law enforcement who noted the smell of burnt

material and small fires had been set throughout the home and the Hardwick Fire Department was called as a precaution.

"We are in the middle of the investigation to determine if it's a possible arson or not," he said.

Caution tape was placed around the single-story home Monday night to preserve the scene until the fire marshal arrived Tuesday morning.

Luverne counselors buy round building with help from SWIF microloan

Luverne counselors Jill Boltjes and Skie Peltier-Anderson are expanding their business and now own the building where they see clients at Healing Path Counseling & Wellness.

Since 2019 they rented space in the round building at 215 N. Cedar Avenue where Luverne's medical clinic first operated, and they recently bought it from Ronnie and Lowell Feit.

"They bought the building to help small businesses get started by having lower rent," Boltjes said about the Feits. "That is what helped us get started."

The women also were helped by the Southwest Initiative Foundation's (SWIF) Business Finance and Microenterprise Loan Program.

"Mental health services are in high demand in our region, and we're happy to support Jill and Skie in growing their business," said SWIF economic development officer Jackie Turner.

Peltier-Anderson said Healing Path fit the Feits' goal for the building.

"They actually came to us specifically because they love our cause and they wanted the building to go to people who would use it in the same kind of way they intended," Peltier-Anderson said.

Both Boltjes and Peltier-Anderson are licensed professional clinical counselors with master's degrees.

Their therapies can help with domestic and sexual violence, adoption- and attachment-related issues, sexual orientation issues, PTSD, anger problems, depression and anxiety.

They also focus on birth to age 5 interventions, crisis intervention and parent education.

Therapy dogs in training, Ray and Koda, work alongside Boltjes and Peltier-Anderson, who currently have nearly 30 clients under their care.

"As Healing Path grows, we want to thoughtfully expand our services to meet the community's needs," Peltier-Anderson said.

"We're thinking about what whole person wellness means to our clients and exploring different types of services like massage therapy, reiki or trauma-

1943: Diamond Club turns spotlight to resident Mathilda Schneekloth

The following article is part of the Diamond Club Member group that began in the January 7, 1943, issue of the Rock County Star Herald. Members of this group consist of persons of age 75 and older.

This article appeared in the April 29, 1943, edition of The Rock County Star Herald.

Aresident of Rock county since 1909, and a resident of Luverne since she and her husband retired from farming a number of years ago, Mrs. William Schneekloth, Luverne, says she likes this community better than any community in which she has lived

She was born in Scott county, Ia. Oct. 12, 1886, the daughter of Henry and Sophie Miller. The fifth of a family of eight, she was given the name Mathilda. She spent all of her girlhood living at home, and because she had four brothers and a sister older than herself, she states she was relieved of

much of the hard work that most youngsters of that era had to do. Even then, however, she was called on to do work out of doors as well as indoors. When she became old enough to do the heavier tasks about the farm, she and her sister were required to do the milking. Between them, they milked as high as 16 head at one time, taking it as a matter of course, much the same as the modern girl makes her regular trip to the beauty shop.

The Miller family lived about two miles away from school, and Mrs. Schneekloth states that most of the time, she and her brothers and sisters walked every morning

and evening. "In those days, it didn't seem to be so particular if one went to school or not," Mrs. Schneekloth states. "When we weren't busy and needed at home to help with the work, we'd go to school, but work always came first. No one ever permitted his education to interfere with his homework."

Home economics during

the time Mrs. Schneekloth was a girl was taught either in the farm home kitchen or in the dining room or living room where the sewing table was kept. Keeping a family of eight children in clothes, to say nothing of herself and her husband was no small task for her mother, and Mrs.

Schneekloth helped her with much of the work as soon as she was old enough to do so. "We not only made clothes for the girls and for the smaller children, she states, but for the men folks too. Buying everything ready made was unheard of at that time," Mrs. Schneekloth states.

Even after ready made dresses came into their own, she continued to make her own clothing. "When we celebrated our silver wedding anniversary 27 years ago, I still hadn't had a store dress," she declares.

Cooking and baking too were learned not for the sake of convenience, but because of necessity. A large family, especially where grownups and young folks alike spend a good deal of the time in the out of doors, requires good, substantial food and plenty of it. Being one of the older girls, she learned at an early age to bake and prepare meals.

When Mrs. Schneekloth was about 13, she had to quit

school and come home to "learn how to make good bread for the rest of the family." Her mother was seriously ill, and being the oldest girl left at home, the burden of the housework fell on her shoulders. Mrs. Schneekloth's mother died some time later, and from that time until she was married, she was family cook, baker and housekeeper.

The hardest work she has ever done, she relates, is helping the men during the haying season. Often times she helped to level the hay and push it back into the corners of the hay mow after it had been hauled in. On a hot day, pitching hay inside where there was little ventilation proved to be as difficult a job as any she has ever tackled, she states.



MINUTES OF REGULAR SCHOOL BOARD MEETING OF

INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 2184, ROCK COUNTY, LUVERNE, MINNESOTA A special meeting of the Board of Education, ISD #2184, was held in the

District Office on August 11, 2022, at 7:00 p.m. The following members were present: Katie Baustian, Jodi Bosch, Colleen Deutsch, Eric Hartman, Tim Jarchow, and Reva Sehr. Absent: David Wrigg. Also present: Craig Oftedahl, Tyler Reisch, Becky Rahm, and Shelby McQuay with Ehlers,

Chairperson Eric Hartman opened the meeting with the Pledge of Allegiance. It was noted there is an addendum to the agenda. Motion made by Bosch, second by Baustian, to approve the agenda with addendum. Motion unanimously carried.

Shelby McQuay with Ehlers, Inc. reviewed the general obligation school building bonds with the school board. The 2017 original election for the general obligation bonds had a limit to the amount that could be bonded at that time. Since that time, this limit has been lifted. The School District can now issue these bonds to complete the dollar amount that was originally approved by the voters in 2017. These will be short term bonds in the timeframe of 6 years and 11 months. With the State Agriculture Credits, the District will still be under the total tax impact approved by the voters. Member Jarchow introduced the following resolution and moved its adoption, which motion was seconded by Member Bosch:

RESOLUTION RELATING TO \$405,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION SCHOOL BUILDING BONDS, SERIES 2022A; AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE, PROVIDING FOR SALE, AND COVENANTING AND OBLIGATING THE DISTRICT TO BE

BOUND BY AND USE THE STATE CREDIT ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM BE IT RESOLVED by the School Board (the Board) of Independent School District No. 2184 (Luverne Public Schools), Minnesota (the District), as follows: SECTION 1. AUTHORIZATION AND ELECTION. This Board hereby deter-

mines it is in the best interests of the District to authorize the issuance and sale of its General Obligation School Building Bonds, Series 2022A in the approximate principal amount of \$405,000 (the Bonds), the proceeds to be used to finance the acquisition and betterment of school sites and facilities as approved by the electors at a special election held on November 7, 2017, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 475.

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

He'll work with administrators on truancy and will investigate criminal complaints regarding juveniles.

"He will assist school admin with enforcement, but will not be the school disciplinarian," Verbrugge said.

Stratton will be first on the scene of an intruder incident while other law enforcement officers are called for assistance.

"Hopefully we won't have a bad situation," Stratton said.

"That's why we have this position — be as prepared as possible."

SRO program is jointly funded

The \$100,000 school resource officer budget is funded through a city, county and school agreement.

The city of Luverne agreed to fund a third of the program along with the county.

The two schools' costs are prorated as four days in Luverne and one day a week in H-BC.

Stratton, who joined the Rock County office in January 2020, was the sole applicant for the position. "I've done a lot in my career already," he said.

"This is something else I can do to further my career."

Stratton grew up in Luverne and graduated from LHS in 1998. He worked with his uncles at Cor-Tech Manufacturing until 2003 when he went back to school for a law enforcement career.

"I was literally walking through the shop one day and heard on the radio that Minnesota West was offering a law enforcement class for the first time," Stratton said.

He and deputy Daryl Fuerstenberg were in the first graduating

Stratton worked near the Twin Cities for more than 15 years before he and his wife, Amy (an Adrian native), moved back to Rock County. They have three grown daughters.

"Family was the biggest catalyst," he said. "When you have a bad day, there is always that personal connection."

Stratton served on the Luverne School Board, a position he resigned in late July when he was hired as school resource officer.

"I truly do like kids and I like helping, that's why I was on the school board — to make Luverne



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

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

"Gannon had a great season last year, and it will be fun to see what he can do this year in his senior season," Oye said.

Ahrendt said he's looking forward to his final season with the Cardinals.

"I am excited about our home games and getting to play in front of family and friends," Ahrendt said.

The Cardinals will start the season with a trio of potential quarterbacks after losing Casey Sehr to graduation.

Looking to replace Sehr are juniors Conner Connell (6'4, 225) and Jacob Stroh (6'2, 180) and sophomore Carter Sehr (5'10, 150). Each of the quarterbacks provides a unique skill set that differenti-

ates him from the others.

"Connell played a lot on varsity last year at a variety of positions so he has some experience," Oye said. "Stroh is a good leader, and Sehr is an athletic quarterback."

Running the ball is always a staple of the Luverne offense, and the Cardinals have some options in the backfield.
